ATHENS, Greece, April 12.—A grand banquet was given at the palace today at which 200 guests were present, including the organizers of the Olympic games and the contestants. Many toasts were given. The king made a speech in French, in which he made the following reference to the foreign contestants which elicited loud and prolonged applause:

"I feel the pleasure that all feel in seeing you come here to take part in the Olympic games. Your reception shows how the Greeks are anxious to receive you. I seize this occasion to extend my warmest congratulations to the victors. You will return to your homes. I will not say adieu to you, but an revoir. Keep a good souvenir of an and do not forget how glad we were to see you."

ATHENS, Greece, April 14.—All the Americans who took part in the international games are greatly pleased. Robert Garrett, captain of the Princeton team, says: "I have been treated splendidly. Hunger is felt on every side, and constant alarm is manifested. Gunshots are heard almost every night, and occasionally houses are burned. The husbands are entirely abandoned by their wives, who have taken refuge in the city. The streets are filled with the wailing of a hungry population and without hope of finding a roof to shelter them.

The Democratic state committee meet in Concord Friday to locate their state convention.

The Primary school is considerably crowded and it is owing to this fact as well as time on the part of the teacher, that it will be impossible to take in a beginner's class into the village Primary school this term. Under the present State law the school year proper begins in the fall.

Meetings of Organization.
Agreeable to notice, the incorporators of the two banking institutions for which they hold charters, met at Antrim House, Monday afternoon for organization. These charters have been in their hands for about three years, and to longer hold them it became necessary to organize by choice of officers and to adopt a code of by-laws, hold meetings annually, and by so doing the charter may be held for a term of years whether business of a banking nature is transacted or not. The meeting was called for by Mr. E. W. Baker, Esq., who read the call for the meeting, and F. G. Warner was chosen president pro tem, and Mr. Baker secretary pro tem, for the organization of the ANTRIM LOAN AND BANKING COMPANY.

A code of by-laws was adopted, providing that a clerk be elected, a board of nine directors be elected, annual meetings be held, and governing the manner of doing business. E. W. Baker was elected clerk of the corporation, and a board of directors was elected who held their meeting immediately after the adjournment of the above meeting and made the choice of the following officers:

President—D. H. Goodell.
Vice President—Morris Christie.
Sec'y and Treas.—E. W. Baker.

Mr. Baker was also elected clerk of this corporation, when the meeting adjourned.

Some remarks were made by those present in relation to starting the business of either of these organizations. It was thought if either institution was launched upon our people within a year's time or later it would be the savings bank, as, everything considered, it would in many ways be a benefit to the people and the town. However, it is very probable nothing of the kind will be attempted during the present year.

This most worthy townsman passed away April 11, 1896, aged 80 years. He was born in Washington, N. H., Feb. 9, 1816; married Mary C., daughter of John Duncan, May 12, 1853; and had lived in town since his boyhood,—more than 70 years. Mr. Hutchinson was a diligent, industrious, hard-working, pains-taking, and successful farmer.
