Street Hearings.

At the Selectmen's room on Monday were held adjourned meetings for the hearings on the laying out of new streets, on petitions of H. B. Raleigh and C. R. Jameson. The selectmen heard the case of Mr. Raleigh in the morning, and several citizens had a voice in the matter; decision reserved.

Mr. Jameson's case was heard in the afternoon, and we are told the Selectmen refused to build the street. The following is Mr. Jameson's plea before the Selectmen:

In asking for this street, a part of Summit Avenue about 900 feet in length, I call your attention that since surveying this property into lots early in the spring, have built a two-story double tenement house on lot No. 2 which is plastered and ready for finishing; also a two-story tenement house is erected ready to be shingled, on lot No. 2, on Pleasant Avenue I have on lot No. 7 a cellar ready for the underpinning, and nearly opposite on a lot not numbered another cellar which will be done the last part of the present week, on which I intend to build and have ready for occupancy January, 1897; that those two lots are the two nearest to Pleasant Street, that I intend if I do not sell to a party, to build a cellar on lot No. 3, also another one on a tract of land on the corner of proposed Summit Avenue and proposed Pine Street, having the cellars ready before the snow falls; that I have parties talking strongly of buying lots No. 1 and No. 11; that No. 10 is already sold; that having built on this tract of land which was taxed but \$200 at the last invoice, have developed this property so that it would certainly be taxed for \$2100 next spring, and it would pay the interest at 3 per cent, for twice the amount that it would cost to build the street. I feel warranted in asking that the town build this street through at once; certainly it can be built at low a price now as at any season of the year, and will make it so the water pipe can be placed in by the commissioners to supply the houses and assist in making a reasonable home for the mechanic. The houses and lots opened by the building of Jameson Avenue, pay a tax of over \$125 yearly, the street which was built by my petition.

I call the attention of the selectmen that I have sold all my lots on Concord Street, all which I own on West Street, and all but three on Jameson Avenue. One of these which I intend to build for myself when convenient; another is so it cannot be sold, therefore I feel justified in saying it is but my right that the town of Antrim should build this street for me and help facilitate the building on these lots which will be paying for both the town and the architect, opening homes for the mechanics which any one who has investigated most certainly be assured are greatly needed.

The fact that I have been instrumental in building and inducing parties to build on these lots which have heretofore been open on the street, and being situated in business so that I can place them so that they will be built upon and be an advantage to the town, I believe it is for the town's interest to build this street through, thereby enabling me and others to place buildings upon these lots at less expense and enabling us to sell them at a lower price; also helping the improvement of these lots and securing buildings on them at an earlier date than if the street is delayed, not only helping in the taxation, but giving employment to men during the winter which they would not have otherwise.

Within the past five years, have built or improved, 1. I induced other parties to in building and repairing on property in my hands to the amount of at least \$25,000 in Antrim.

ATMOSPHERIC ELECTRICITY.

The Experiment Suggested by Franklin and Performed by FAIBARD.

To Benjamin Franklin belongs the merit of having perceived that a direct experiment was needed to prove what so far was only a guess. In an article entitled "Opinions and Conjectures Concerning the Properties and Effects of the Electrical Matter Arising From Experiments and Observations Made at Philadelphia, 1749," the following passage occurs:

"To determine the question whether the clouds that contain lightning are electrified or not, I would propose an experiment to be tried, where it can be done conveniently. On the top of some high tower or steep place a kind of sentry box, big enough to contain a man and an electrical stand. From the middle of the stand let an iron rod rise and pass, inside of the door, and then upright 20 feet or 30 feet, pointed very sharp at the end. If the electrical stand be kept clean and dry, a man standing on it when such clouds are passing low might be electrified and afford sparks, the rod drawing fire to him from a cloud.

"If any danger to the man should be apprehended, though I think there would be none, let him stand on the floor of his box, and now and then bring near to the rod the loop of a wire that has one end fastened to the leads, he holding it by a wax handle, so the sparks, if the rod be electrified, will strike from the rod to the wire and not affect him."

The experiment suggested by Franklin was successfully performed in Marly, France, by D'Alembert, on May 19, 1752; in London by Canton, in Spital Square, on July 20, 1752, and by Wilson in Chelmsford, Essex, on Aug. 12 of the same year. Franklin himself described having used a kite in Philadelphia in a letter of 1751, but he never gave the date of his observations. But this point he supplied in some message which I have not been able to find, for Rosenbarger ("Geschichte der Physik," volume 2, page 216) mentioned that it was done in June.

Franklin's disbelief in the dangerous character of the experiment must have rested a severe shock when he heard of the death of G. W. Richmann, who, in the year 1753, was killed by an electric discharge drawn from the clouds by means of a kite.—Nature.

OLD BIRDS' NESTS.

Many Feathered Creatures Use the Same Old Bird's Nest.

"That common expression for worthlessness, 'It has no more value than a last year's bird's nest,' said a bird fancier to a New York Press reporter, 'is often far from correct. The majority of our birds do leave their nests after raising a brood, but many do not, and their nests are used in a successive season of years. I have known some birds to use their nests ten years in succession, and so persistent are they that many times the female will return even after the nest has been robbed and the male killed. Among these nests of perennial nests are the wrens, some of the swallow family, bluebirds, great crested flycatcher, some of the owls, eagles, chickadees and some woodpeckers.

"They repair to the nest each year and often build it over. A little wren has made its nest in a tree in my garden and has occupied it for the last eight years. Each year it has piled on new stuff till the hole is almost filled up. Some say that as soon as it becomes crowded the birds will clean it out. I know of a bluebird's nest that has been saved seven years. It is the same female year after year, for she has two back wing feathers and is lame.

"Birds that build in exposed situations, like kingbirds, always build their nests in a hole in a tree in a hole new for every brood. Some never build. They either lay in the nests of other birds or in the sand. The eagle and the owl make a framework of sticks and slight repairs are needed. Many birds' nests that you find have never been used. For instance, the marsh wren builds several with the idea that in the case of disturbance the male will attract attention to the nests other than that in which the female is brooding and so shield her from enemies."

Ingalls in a Puss.

"Speaking of lawyers fussing in court," said Chief of Police Seib, "one of the most violent affairs I can remember occurred about 20 years ago, and John J. Ingalls and Judge C. G. Foster were the principals. I was sheriff at the time, and a man being tried on some kind of a criminal charge. Foster was acting as county attorney, and Ingalls represented the prisoner. Ingalls and Foster became involved in an argument about some point of evidence, and, after jangling each other for some time, Ingalls finally called Foster a liar. Foster was at one end of a long table and Ingalls at the other. Foster grabbed a huge ink fountain and threw it at Ingalls, hitting him in the breast and spluttering ink all over Judge, jury and all kinds of legal papers. The late Nathan Price was judge, and he fined them \$50 each. They apologized next morning, and their fines were remitted.—Aitchison Globe.

Lincoln's Last Law Case.

"Speaking of Lincoln's birthday," said Senator Palmer, "reminds me that the very last case Lincoln ever tried was one in which I, too, was engaged. It was in Springfield, in June, 1860, after Mr. Lincoln had received the presidential nomination. Old David Baker, who had been a senator in the early days, had sued the trustees of Shurtleiff college, my alma mater, for expelling his grandson, a lad named Will Gilbert. Mr. Lincoln appeared for the prosecution. I was the college attorney. Mr. Lincoln came into court, and the judge said to him: 'Mr. Lincoln, I'll argue this case for you. You have too much on your hands already. You haven't any case.' And he explained the law and application.

"Well," said Mr. Lincoln, with a smile, "don't you want to hear a speech from me?"

"No," said the judge, and the last case Mr. Lincoln tried he—well, he didn't try it at all.—Washington Post.

Glavo's Keger Spirit.

Among the young officials who were waiting appointments at Leopolville was Mr. E. J. Glavo. He appeared to be a slim, tall boy of 18 or 19, but during the few days I remained at Leopolville I saw that he was a man of slender, well educated, fond of sketching, and eager for active service. I was always on the lookout for willing spirits. Every European seemed willing enough when he first landed on the river, but very few, after an experience of the fever, long retained their willingness. However, Glavo condemned his situation, and when offered a chance of proving his mettle and ability at Luakola, became aglow with animation.—Henry M. Stanley in Century.
