

Daniel Webster himself said and believed that much of the region west of the Mississippi would forever remain a wilderness. The use of anesthetics, by which surgical operations are robbed of nine-tenths of their danger and terror, was not known at the time.

There was not a telephone, a bicycle, a phonograph, an electric light or a typewriting machine in existence, and Elias Howe, inventor of the sewing machine, was just making his desperate fight to obtain the legal right to his new invention.

We pity the people of those days—we do indeed—and once more we are glad we are alive now!

The assertion of Baron von Buelow, German minister of foreign affairs, that there never had been relations between representatives of the German government and Captain Dreyfus may be regarded in the light of a diplomatic statement. Nothing is easier than to get around it. Dreyfus could easily have secured his important secrets to a private individual (German), and this private individual could have handed them over to an agent of the government. Thus the officials of the government could very well deny that they had ever had communication of any kind with Dreyfus. The statement would be a falsehood all the same, however.

Apparently Hawaii could have done nothing more favorable for her cause than to send her president, Mr. Dole, to us. He is a man of uncommonly fine and imposing physical presence, being five feet nine inches tall and having a frank, kindly and dignified manner. He has made a most favorable impression at Washington.

The eclipse of the sun was celebrated in India with religious ceremonies. While it was in progress thousands of Hindoos bathed themselves as part of the programme. If an eclipse had that kind of influence on civilized people, we ought to have one at least once a week.
