

Easter Celebrated

At the Churches by Appropriate Exercises and Sermons.

Easter, at once the most joyous and impressive of Christian festivals, gets its name from Ostara, a heathen goddess, deity of spring and of flowers. Our Saxon ancestors glorified the day as the forerunner of summer with its fair crops, its out-door life and its opportunities for communion with nature.

Easter has always been a gentle festival and has ever had a softening effect on mankind. It is a day of good fellowship and of kindly feelings which unite all men into one brotherhood.

To the Christian the day comes as a gleam of sunshine comes to nature after dreary days of darkness and storm, because the resurrection is the great proof of the divinity of Christ; and the open tomb must for all time be the evidence of the truth which the Saviour preached to men that man is saved through the sacrifice of a God made man.

Thus it is that the day is one that all churches delight to celebrate—a day which is ever dear to them, and which as time goes on is seemingly thought more of by the people.

At the Presbyterian church the special exercises prepared for the day took the hour of the regular morning service, and were in charge of Scott E. Emery, Superintendent of the Sunday School, and consisted of a special order of service for this occasion, which was most acceptably carried out.

This service was not tiresome and long as they too often are but was of a good length to please all, and the several parts were well committed and nicely rendered, showing care on the part of the committee in charge. A pleasing feature of the occasion was the presence of Dr. Cochrane who has for the past two weeks been confined to his home by illness.

The decorations of the church for the day were beautiful in appearance and tastefully arranged, the potted plants—many in full bloom—made a handsome display, and the motto "He Is Risen," above and back of the pulpit, was artistically entwined with evergreen. The program as given appears below:

It has been the opinion of many for some time that the check stamp law should be repealed along with some other sections of the war revenue tax, consequently it was not surprising to learn that Secretary Gage has made a recommendation to the President that the war taxes could be considerably reduced. This is late news from our Washington correspondent.

Secretary Gage has made a verbal recommendation to the President that a special message be sent to Congress, suggesting legislation for a material reduction in the internal revenue war taxes. Figures given by Secretary Gage show that the surplus of revenue over expenditures for the current fiscal year already exceeds \$53,000,000 and is likely to be largely added to during the last quarter. Mr. Gage thinks the war taxes could be safely cut in half, and the President has the matter under consideration.
