## A BENNINGTON MAN. <br> He Died in Mexico, and is Remembered by Many in

 This Locality.It may be interesting to some to know that the late Frederick Augustus Newton; who died few weeks ago in Mexico, leavin a fortune of $\$ 10,000,000$. and the reputation of being the richest American in that country, was at one time a resident of this town His life was an interesting and adventurous one, more or less fraught with danger, being identified as he was with early.life in Mexico when the country was filled with Indians and traveling Mr. Nardous in the extreme. Bennington for parents lived in Bennington for over forty year and now lie buried in the village
His only surviving relative in the United States bearing the name of Newton, is Frederick A Newton of this place. who is his ephew and namesake.
Mr. Newton was born in Al. stead. this state, in 1826, and was the son of Lither and Harriet Griswold) Newton. He was the dren, only one of whom Jre riet Burker, of Woromer riet Barker, o
now survives.
Mr. Newton's educational ad vantages were very limited, h leaving schowl at the age of 12 years, and going to work in his
father's paper mill at Warner, $N$ father's paper mill at Warner, N H. Suon after this he went to a paper mill in Franklin, of which tendet: ; while working at this place he made the acquaintance of the Hon. Warren Daniels and frieud.
It was during Mr. Newton's boyhood that his parents removed to Bennington, and with them he made his homn, although he wa away working in Franklin and ther places more or less of the time.

In the course of a few lears, he having saved up the sum of $\$ 1$, 000. Mr. Newton purchnsed for his parents what was known as the Cummings Cross place in this village, consisting of a crizy cottage and plot of land; here his parents spent the remainder of their days and here now resides the widow of his brother, John Newton, with her son Frederick A. Newton and daughter, Mrs. Minnie (Newton) Marsh.
In 1818 , at the age of $22, \mathrm{Mr}$.

Newton went to Guadalajara
Mexico, where he was a -pape mill superintendent until the pening of the Civil War, when he embarked in the cotton busi massed his fortione
His wifé was a Mexican lady to whom he was married in 1866 and who, together with two sons and our daughters now aurvive him In 1861 Mr : Newton came back In 1801 Mr. Newton came back o the States for the first time and spent the summer with his parents Lere. After this, from ime to time, he returned to thi vicinity in order to keep in touch with his relatives and minister to the welfare of his parents.
During one of: these visits he purchased several of the famous Concord Stage Coaches of the Ab bott Downing Co' of Concord and hipped them to Mexico ther be ing thed them to ever seen in that country:

will no of the old resident will no doubt recall Mr. Newton and, in fact, it is only a few year since he paid his last visit to his elatives here.
At the time of his death he wried 135,000 acres of land in Mexico and carried on extensive coffee and sugar cane plantations
