A BENNINGTON MAN.

He Died in Mexico, and is Re membered by Many in This Locality.

It may be interesting to some to know that the late Frederick Augustus Newton, who died a few weeks ago in Mexico, leaving a fortune of \$10,000,000 and the reputation of being the richest American in that country, was at one time a resident of this town. His life was an interesting and adventurous one, more or less fraught with danger, being identified as he was with early life in Mexico when the country was filled with Indians and traveling was hazardous in the extreme.


Mr. Newton's parents lived in Bennington for over forty years and now lie buried in the village cemetery.

His only surviving relative in the United States bearing the name of Newton, is Frederick A. Newton of this place, who is his nephew and namesake.

Mr. Newton was born in Alstead, this state, in 1826, and was the son of Luther and Harriet (Griswold) Newton. He was the second of a family of nine children, only one of whom, Mrs. Harriet Barker, of Worcester, Mass., now survives.

Mr. Newton's educational advantages were very limited, he leaving school at the age of 12 years, and going to work in his father's paper mill at Warner, N. H. Soon after this he went to a paper mill in Franklin, of which he eventually became superintendent; while working at this place he made the acquaintance of the Hon. Warren Daniels and was his room-mate and close frieud.

In the course of a few years, he having saved up the sum of \$1,-000, Mr. Newton purchased for his parents what was known as the Cummings Cross place in this village, consisting of a cozy cottage and plot of land; here his parents spent the remainder of their days and here now resides the widow of his brother, John Newton, with her son Frederick A. Newton and daughter, Mrs. Minnie (Newton) Marsh.

who, together with two sons and four daughters now survive him.

In 1861 Mr. Newton came back to the States for the first time and spent the summer with his parents here. After this, from time to time, he returned to this vicinity in order to keep in touch with his relatives and minister to the welfare of his parents.

During one of these visits he purchased several of the famous Concord Stage Coaches of the Abbott Downing Co. of Concord, and shipped them to Mexico, they being the first vehicles of the kind ever seen in that country.

Many of the older residents will no doubt recall Mr. Newton and, in fact, it is only a few years since he paid his last visit to his relatives here.

At the time of his death he owned 135,000 acres of land in Mexico and carried on extensive coffee and sugar cane plantations.

Mrs. John G. Flint, a member of one of Milwaukee's prominent families, and a leading cluhwoman and philanthropic worker, died anddenly at her home, 272 Martin street, last night. She had been confined to her bed for the last three days but her death was unexpected and was due to heart failure.

Mrs. Flint was 64 years of age and had resided in Milwaukee all her life, her maiden name having been Frances Kneeland. Her husband, the founder of the J. G. Flint company, died ten vears ago and she and her only son, Wyman Kneelaud Flint, have retained active interest in the business, Mrs. Fligt holding the office of vice president. Besides her son and two grandchildren, she leaves two sisters, Mrs. E. C. Sexton and Mrs. Walter S Chandler.

For many years she had held prominent positions in several of the leading clubs and charities. She was a member of the Milwaukee Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Society of Colonial Dames in Wisconsin, the Woman's club of Wisconsin, and the Milwaukee College Endowment association. She always took deep interest in charity work and was one of the women to whom the establishment and worz of the Wisconsin Training School for Nurses was largely due. She was a director of the Protestant Orphan asylum.






