The Mirror and Farmer takes about a column and a half of valuable editorial space telling how it was "just-a-happen-so" at the last minute that the "Primary Election Law" plank was thrown into the Republican platform and the convention opened its mouth and swallowed the whole thing, platform, planks and all. It says in substance that it is nothing the party wants and sincerely hopes the legislators will see the situation as it (The Mirror) does. Much argument is put forth in an effort to show that the whole thing is a ponderous affair, not practical, and a matter not worth looking into, much more trying.

Now, this is just what THE REPORTER has said before; politicians don't want a Primary Election Law! It is the last thing they would be willing to submit to! They also tell that the Australian or secret ballot is a humbug; the old system is much better! What do the common people think? Do they enjoy their independence? It will be some time before the trick of taking a backward step along this line will be attempted!

It is also thought that the legislators will consider very seriously before they vote against a direct Primary Law, when it comes up in the General Court this winter, what the common people whose votes put them into position to represent them demand and need for protection and advancement. Our Representatives and Senators will do well to keep favor with their constituency rather than parley with a few politicians who have become accustomed somewhat in thinking and acting for others.

Again, let it be distinctly understood that nine times out of every ten, that what a politician advocates as the thing needed by either one of the great parties is the very thing that will not be of any assistance whatever to the people!

Legislators, canvas your constituency and be assured you are acting and voting according to the best interests of your own individual district of whatever subject comes up, especially so on the matter of the Primary Election Law!

Always and Ever Forging Ahead!

The war of words relative to the efficiency or deficiency of our battleships still rages. Admiral Evans is out in a magazine article claiming that our battleships are the best in the world and criti cising Reuterdahl's late magazine article in which he quoted extensively President Roosevelt's words in language by no means as optimistic as that of "Fighting Bob". The President openly sides with the younger officers of the Navy who believe that millions have been wasted in the construction of small and useless ships and in the mis-construction. partial at least, of the larger ships. The question of the efficiency of the American Navy may possibly never be determined except in war with a first class naval power and inasmuch as there are only four others, England, France, Germany, Japan, let us hope we may never know whether our ships are as good as theirs or not. Meanwhile the controversy cannot but be helpful. Admiral Evans was not the inventor of his soubriquet, "Fighting Bob" and is no more of a fighter than hundreds of other naval officers in the service. His naval education, antedating the war and continued in obsolete hulks. would scarcely entitle his judgement to the weight of the judgement of those officers who have been educated in the recent improved curriculum of the Naval Academy and have supplemented this education by study of recent naval architecture in England, Germany and France. 

MEAT IN ITALY.

The Way the Slaughter Houses Are Operated by Law.

Slaughter houses in Italy are public institutions. The law prescribes that every town of more than 6,000 inhab itants shall build and maintain a mu nicipal \ slaughter, house, where all butchers are compelled to bring their live stock to be killed. The slaughtering itself is done by the individual butchers and their assistants. The conveyance of the cattle, the removal of the carcasses and the dressing of the meat are likewise the affair of the butchers. The city provides the building, keeps it clean and furnishes vet-erinary inspectors to examine and pass upon the carcasses.

The Milan slaughter house is situated within the city and occupies several acres of ground. It consists of a number of long, single story buildings made of cement and stucco. The buildings consist of either a single large hall or else a row of small box stalls about twenty-five feet wide and either fifteen or thirty feet deep. Each stall has a wide double door in front and a window behind. The buildings are arranged in parallel pairs, each pair being connected by a covered passage thirty feet wide, whose roof is raised many feet above that of the buildings. being supported by pillars rising from the roofs on either side. The air thus circulates under the roofs of the passages or corridors and over the build-

The Chief Dangers Lie in Panic and Overexertion.

Let the man who is lost in the woods be very careful not to overexert himself. His chief dangers lie in panic and overexertion, and, though he may be in a great hurry to find shelter. I must warn him to go slowly. Two miles an hour, on an average, through the snow in the woods is all that a man in his condition will be able to stand without overfatigue and its attendant dangers, overheating and perspiration. By exercising caution a man may live through a week of what he is undergoing.

The yearly report of Mr. Capers, the Commissioner of the Internal Revenue Bureau, shows a decline of 40 millions of gallons in the distillation of grain spirits. Miefly whiskey. He explains that the prohibition movement, the high price of grain and the compact agreement among distillers to limit the quantity of distilled liquors, are the cause of this decrease. Among the hopeful indications of the time, there is none more inspiring than the decrease in the use of strong drink and millions of people are anxiously anticipating the statistics of the future with the hope that the coming years may show an accelerated disuse of this potent source of misery and crime. It is calculated that the government has lost 18 millions of dollars during the past year in the falling off of the whiskey tax. but, the gain, as will be admitted by all reflecting people, is immeasurably greater then the loss in money.
