Editorial Pen Tips

This Should be a "Government of the People, by the People, and for the People!"

The Mirror and Farmer takes about a column and a half of valuable editorial space telling how it was "just-a-happen-so" at the last minute that the "Primary Election Law" plank was thrown into the Republican platform and the convention opened its mouth and swallowed the whole thing, platform, planks and all. It says in substance that it is nothing the party wants and sincerely hopes the legislators will see the situation as it (The Mirror) does. Much argument is put forth in an effort to show that the whole thing is a ponderous affair, not practical, and a matter not worth looking into, much more trying.

Now, this is just what THE REPORTER has said before; politicians don't want a Primary Election Law! It is the last thing they would be willing to submit to! They also tell that the Australian or secret ballot is a humbug; the old system is much better! What do the common people think? Do they enjoy their independence? It will be some time before the trick of taking a backward step along this line will be attempted!

It is also thought that the legislators will consider very seriously before they vote, against a direct Primary Law, when it comes up in the General Court this winter, what the common people whose votes put them into position to represent them demand and need for protection and advancement. Our Representatives and Senators will do well to keep favor with their constituency rather than parley with a few politicians who have become accustomed somewhat in thinking and acting for others.

Again, let it be distinctly understood that nine times out of every ten, that what a politician advocates as the thing needed by either one of the great parties is the very thing that will not be of any assistance whatever to the people!

Legislators, canvas your constituency and be assured you are acting and voting according to the best interests of your own individual district or whatever subject comes up, especially so on the matter of the Primary Election Law!

Always and Ever Forging Ahead!

The war of words relative to the efficiency or deficiency of our battleships still rages. Admiral Evans is out in a magazine article claiming that our battleships are the best in the world and criticizing Reuter Dahl's late magazine article in which he quoted extensively President Roosevelt's words in language by no means as optimistic as that of "Fighting Bob". The President openly sides with the younger officers of the Navy who believe that millions have been wasted in the construction of small and useless ships and in the mis-construction, partial at least, of the larger ships. The question of the efficiency of the American Navy may possibly never be determined except in war with a first class naval power and inasmuch as there are only four others, England, France, Germany, Japan, let us hope we may never know whether our ships are as good as theirs or not. Meanwhile the controversy cannot but be helpful. Admiral Evans was not the inventor of his sobriquet, "Fighting Bob" and is no more of a fighter than hundreds of other naval officers in the service. His naval education, antedating the war and continued in obsolete hulks, would scarcely entitle his judgement to the weight of the judgement of those officers who have been educated in the recent improved curriculum of the Naval Academy and have supplemented this education by study of recent naval architecture in England, Germany and France. There comes a time in the life of every man and every fighter when he is disposed to cling to old things, old friends, old ships, old times, but the history of progress shows a continuous elimination of the old and an adoption of the improved and new.

This date being so very close to the holiday so dearly loved by our people generally, it seems not out of place to extend to one and all our sincere wishes for a bright and happy Merry Christmas!

Death of Mrs. Marion Elizabeth Musson

The wife of W. R. Musson, M. D., daughter of Harry Deacon of this town, was perhaps one of the most popular residents of the town; loved by all who knew her because of her amiable disposition and her cheery good natured manner.

In speaking of her death which occurred at her home on Wednesday last at 6 p. m. we recall one of the saddest events which has befallen this town. Bright, cheerful, hopeful, she worked on with the fondest anticipation toward the time when she should be the happiest of her life, when the dream of her life would indeed be realized, never once doubting but that all would be well.

On Friday, Dec 11th, Mrs. Musson was obliged to take to her bed and medical attendance was called. Although quite sick she would rally at times and in her bright, cheerful way, she would assure those about her that she was better.

On Wednesday at 4 o'clock p. m., a little baby girl was born and the chain of happiness seemed complete, the patient, faithful mother faintly expressing her delight on being told of her baby girl. Shortly after the birth of the child unfavorable symptoms appeared and the best of medical attendance exerted every means and every energy in their power to forestall that which they feared. The will of God was otherwise, however; Marion passed on to be with her Maker, leaving a heart broken husband and a motherless little girl.

Her age was 26 years. It was not God's will however, that this fond mother should long be separated from her little one, for on Friday evening at 9.30 he gathered the little one to himself to be with its mother in that bright kingdom where neither mother nor child shall know pain or suffering.

Talented, capable, a true, faithful wife, a friend of everybody! Although it has been supposed by many that Mrs. Musson was delicate and frail because of her fair complexion and slight build, she has been able to be about the house attending to her household duties.

She was a graduate of the class of 1900, A. H. S., a member of the M. E. church and of the Epworth League, taking active part in the doings of both organizations. Being a clever musician she was a prominent figure in some of the best entertainments and social affairs of the town. Her bright, cheerful face and pleasant salutations, will be greatly missed by all who knew her and the memories of her sweet, amiable disposition, will live with those who came in contact with her, for all time.

The funeral services which were largely attended were held at the Deacon residence, Friday afternoon at 1.30 o'clock, Rev. A. M. Mafkey of the Methodist church officiating; Rev. Dr. Cochrane, for a long time her pastor, offered prayer. Music was furnished by male quartet, the selections were "Shall we Meet Beyond the

River?" and "Safe in the Arms of Jesus." The display of beautiful flowers showed in a measure with what esteem the deceased was held by the community.

On Saturday morning early, a simple service was held over the baby and the little one was placed at rest safe in its mother's arms where it seemed to long to go.

The remains were taken to Whitinsville, Mass., for burial and Dr. Musson accompanied by his sister, Miss Estelle Musson, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Deacon, Mr. and Mrs. George Deacon and Howard Deacon, went with them. Interment was at Whitinsville, Saturday afternoon.

Thurston, of the 1st Congregational church, who officiated at the marriage of father and mother of deceased and also at the funeral of her mother about twenty years ago.

The forenoons will be devoted to lectures in the class-rooms, the afternoons to practical work and demonstrations, and the evenings to lectures by prominent agriculturists from neighboring states.

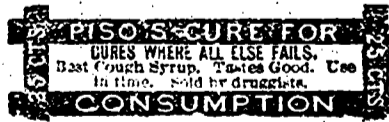
