Our Washington Letter

(From Our Regular Correspondent).

While free from sensationalism, the legislative situation is full of interest and even of intense feeling as concerns the legislators. The President has been absent from the city for five days in Pittsburg, Cincinnati, St. Louis, where he has made speeches. He has been severely criticized for leaving the capitol at a moment when legislation concerning the traffic agreement section of the administration railroad bill was in a precarious situation. There are rumors that the President has said that he would veto the bill if it failed to meet his views and it is certain that the bill cannot be passed as originally presented and as embodying his views as they are understood. The differences between the regulars and insurgents of the Republican party are becoming more and more clearly defined. Yesterday Senator Aldrich of Rhode Island, long known as the leader in the Senate, called together the Republican Senators and explained and emphasized to them the deplorable effect of their apparent defeat by the insurgent Republicans and Democrats. He explained that unless the regulars should recover their ground, the failure would involve the overthrow of the Taft policies and of conservative Republicanism both in Congress and throughout the country. He urged Republicans to get together and stand as a unit against every insurgent attack. It is said that there will be no vote on any proposition in the Senate until the first of next week.

Meanwhile, the President will have returned from the west and there will be conferences between him and the Republican leaders of the House and Senate, and also between him and the insurgent leaders, for the latter persistently claim that they are the real representatives of true Republicanism, of platform Republicanism and of the "Roosevelt policies." It is said that as a result of the conference called by Senator Aldrich, forty-four Senators are pledged to stand by what remains of the railroad bill and other bills involving the President's policies and it is given out that three other Republicans, making forty-seven in all, will join the coalition against the Democrats and insurgents. It is further predicted that at least two Democrats will support the bills urged by the President, and the regulars are claiming that by the first of next week they will have an effective majority—that the insurgents will be outvoted and that for the remainder of the session they can be ignored.

On the other hand, the insurgents have held a long conference relating particularly to the long and short bill amendment proposed by Senator Dixon. It is said that there are sufficient Republican votes to oppose the Dixon amendment, provided they can have the support of the Democrats.

There is an interesting rumor to the effect that when Mr. Roosevelt returns to America it will be to found a great seat of learning or university at Washington with almost unlimited capital. It is even said that this matter was planned and partly arranged before he left this country on his great hunting trip. It is said that Andrew Carnegie will head the subscribers to this institution of learning with a gift amounting to several millions and that other multi-millionaires will put their names to the paper with donations involving seven figures. Mr. Carnegie has just started across the Atlantic to spend his summer at his Scottish castle, Skibo. He will doubtless meet the ex-President, who in a week or ten days will be in England. The ex-President has lived at Washington off and on probably longer than in any other part of the country, and it is here that his influence would be greatest and most widely pervasive, for nowhere else is this part of the world where he came so closely in contact with public men, and nowhere else would his world-wide popularity be so effectively felt. The ex-president is perhaps more distinctively a teacher and preacher than a statesman, or rather it may be said that he is a teacher of statesmanship and a preacher of patriotism by word of mouth. In short, whether at home or abroad, he is a missionary, and whether in Cairo, Rome or Washington, he is preaching and teaching by word and by example.

Antrim Likely to be Possessor of Something Nice

State Trade Report

As reported to Bradstreet's manufacturing business is fairly good and most concerns are busy, but there seems to be a doubt in the minds of most manufacturers as to what is going to turn up, and nearly all are acting conservatively making orders for future goods. Labor of all classes is well employed and there seems to be practically no idle help. The early spring has started vegetation very early and the copious rains have started grass rapidly and the prospects of a good hay crop look very excellent at present. Farmers are busy in preparing the ground and putting in their crops. Retail trade is very brisk in seeds, implements, etc., and about up to its usual mark in clothing, dry goods and shoes. Wholesale trade is fairly good but retail trade is buying conservatively lines which are being shown.

SYLVESTER LITTLE

Dies at His Home in Antrim, His Native Town

One of Antrim's best known and highly respected citizens and a man known throughout the entire state, died at his home on North Main street last Thursday morning after an illness of several months. General Little was the son of the late Deacon William and Abigail (Wells) Little, and was born in Antrim May 28, 1833. His youth was passed in North Branch village; he finished his education at Tubbs Union and Hopkinton academies, and later for fifteen years taught vocal music in this section of the state.

In 1879 he entered the employ of Goodell company as cutlery salesman and was considered one of the best and ablest in the country, traveling in the south and middle west. In 1892, deceased represented Antrim in the Legislature and served as chairman of the insurance committee; in 1889 he was commissary general on the staff of Gov. D. H. Goodell.

March 26, 1880, General Little was married to Miss Mary E. Vose, who survives him, as do also one daughter and one son, who have the sympathy of the entire community in their affliction.

Funeral services were held from his late home on Saturday; Rev. Dr. Cochrane and Rev. D. Salmond of the Presbyterian church, of which deceased was a life-long member, officiated.

Mr. Emery and wife, who have been earnest and faithful workers in this church and also in every good work in town, will be missed from among us where they have made their home most of their life. As a slight testimonial of esteem in which these people are held a purse of sixteen dollars was presented to them. Refreshments of ice cream and cake were served.

The Death of Charles H. Eaton

Occurred in Springfield, Mass., on Friday last. He was a native of Antrim, being son of the late Hiram Eaton; was 65 years of age, and well remembered by many of our people. The following obituary notice appeared in Saturday's issue of the Springfield Republican:

Charles H. Eaton who was operated upon at the Wesson memorial hospital Thursday, as the result of injuries sustained while alighting from a car near his home at 16 Warriner avenue, Tuesday evening, died yesterday morning. Mr. Eaton was for years a well known traveling salesman, and recently became interested in the Morse-Radio automobile company. He was born in Antrim, N. H., May 22, 1845, the son of Hiram and Edith (Sweetzer) Eaton. At the age of 18 he went to Boston, where he began work in a furniture store. Later he was engaged for 12 years as official organizer of the Knights of Honor, branches of that society being formed throughout New England under his supervision. He bought the business of the Peabody manufacturing company at Manchester, N. H., where he continued for a time, and then moved the industry to Worcester. Three years later he sold out to the Westfield plate company of Thompsonville, with whom he remained as a traveling salesman until last July. He came to this city to live in 1906, and made his home in the South end.

Mr. Eaton was a member of Washington lodge of Odd Fellows in Boston, St. Paul's lodge, Scottish rite Masons, in South Boston, Knights of Honor and United Workmen. Besides his widow, he leaves a brother, Walter S. Eaton, and a nephew, Walter H. Eaton, both of Boston. The funeral will be held in Byron's funeral parlors to-morrow evening at 7 o'clock, and the burial will be in Oak Grove cemetery Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

beetles make their home therein with
the spiders. The beetles live on fly
legs, the crumbs and scraps from the
mosquero's table, and pay for their bed
and board by keeping the web house
perfectly clean and 'refined', eating
everything and dropping no litter in
the Mexican professional gentleman's
house. Mrs. Mosquero is a very quiet,
orderly lady who never wanders from
her own breside or strays from her
own back yard, but when a fly calls
round she gets very busy with her
spider knives and saws.—New York
Press.

Lovers of Sports.
The Anglo-Saxons love sport. No
matter in what part of the world they
are found the spirit is strong among
them. Wherever the restless Anglo-
Saxon dominates the love of sport is
dominant. The Americans are—at
least the most of them—descendants of
this virile race, and nowhere is the
love of sport so much exhibited as in
this country. Our people are patrons
of horse racing, of baseball, of golf,
of football, of all out of door sports as
no other people. The English are great
sportsmen, but not to the extent that
Americans are, for the reason that the

Striking Results Shown in a Test With Gray Perch.

Even the fishes of the sea have pic-
tures on memory's wall. Experiments
have been made with several fishes
as to their faculties for remembering,
but the most striking results have been
obtained with the gray perch, which
lives chiefly on small silvery hued
sardines. Some of these were taken
and colored red and were then put
into the tank where the perch was
with several silver colored sardines.
Of course the normal sardines were at
once seized and eaten, but it was not
until hungry that the perch made a
tentative meal of one of the red col-
ored victims.

On recognizing the sardine flavor,
however, he promptly demolished the
remainder. Later the perch devoured
the sardines irrespective of color, thus
showing not only traces of a memory,
but also the power to differentiate
color.

Subsequently sardines colored red
and blue were placed in the tank to-
gether with the silver ones. The same
scene was repeated, the blue sardines
not being attacked until the others
were eaten and hunger compelled in-
vestigation of the newcomers. After
this introduction the perch ate the sar-
dines of all three types without any
difficulty.

Some spines of the sea nettle were
then fastened to the blue sardines.
These were at once avoided by the
perch, which promptly got out of the
way of the newcomers. This showed
traces of memory, as the results of
contact with the sea nettle were shown
and recognized.—Chicago Tribune.

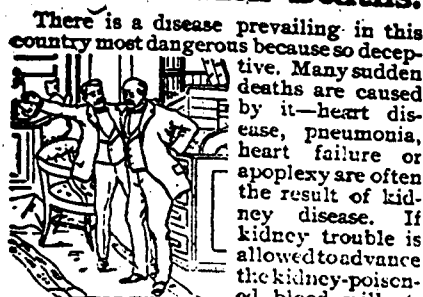

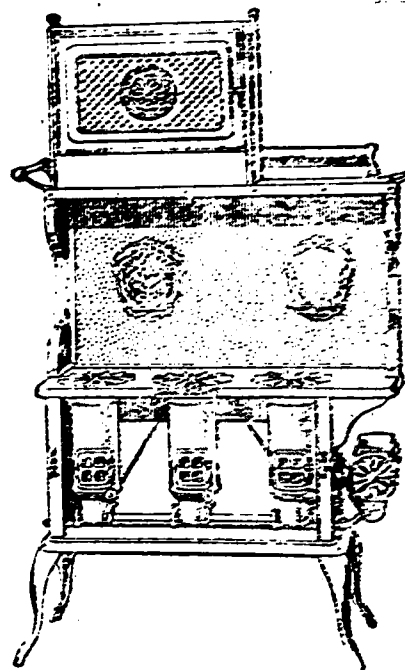
