While definite details are missing, it seems that he had been a bit indisposed nothing was thought of it, and about 7 o'clock suddenly passed away while at his store; possibly the extreme heat had something to do toward hastening the end.

Mr. Perkins was born in East Wilton October 15, 1852, and married Ella E. Little of this town; two children, Carlton and Mary, with the mother are the survivors, who have the sincere sympathy of the entire community in their affliction. Deceased was for many years employed by Goodell Company and at times followed the trade of painting; was Antrim's tax collector, and served several years as Deputy Sheriff. He was a Past Grand of Waverley Lodge, No. 59, I. O. O. F., having had membership here for some 24 years. Among those best acquainted with the deceased, he was known to be an upright and good man, and his long connection with the Methodist church here will be remembered by many with much pleasure.

Funeral services will be held from the Methodist church in this place Thursday at half past twelve, and will be an Odd Fellows funeral; interment at Maplewood.

## DUCKING A SCOLD

A Custom Quite Popular at One Time In This Country.

## WOMEN ALWAYS THE VICTIMS.

In Colonial Days Ducking Stools Were Common In Maryland. In Virginia the Penalty Was Often Inflicted, and Georgia Sinned as Late as 1819.

Nowadays if a woman forms the habit of talking too loud and too long or insists upon saying unpleasant things in wrong places and at wrong seasons there are several things which may happen to her. If she is a person of some social standing her husband may get a divorce, or if she belongs in one of the lower strata he may leave her without that little formality. If she makes life too unbearable for the neighbors she may possibly be arrested and fined. If she lives in England and interrupts the proceedings of parliament, calls names, chases dignitaries to cover whenever they show themselves in public and knocks off policemen's helmets she is called a suffragette and sometimes imprisoned. But even the most obstinately opprobrious and virulent woman, to quote the snooty Addison, may be confident that she will escape the punishment meted out to her sister of old. What ever happens, she won't be sentenced to the ducking stool. In many ways modern life is tame and lacking in dramatic incident for a self assertive lady, and even the English suffragettes complain that they are not taken seriously enough.

No such claim could have been made in the past, say between the fifteenth and eighteenth centuries, when far more rigid views prevailed on the subject of feminine self repression. In those days magistrates were unanimous in the conviction that "meekness is ye choicest ornament for a woman," and it was held a crime to speak "discorfully" of those in authority, civil or ecclesiastical. A woman must not even indulge in too great freedom of speech in the privacy of her own home and neighborhood. Sometimes she did, and then she was attended to in a simple yet spectacular manner.

She was bound securely to a stout chair firmly fixed to the end of a long beam, arranged to work up and down on the principle of the seesaw, on the edge of a river or pond. On the bank at the other end a man worked the contrivance by means of a strong chain, and she was given a ducking, which lasted until justice was satisfied or reform was promised, the populace of course gathering in large numbers to assist at the function.

In England the practice was so general that each town had its ducking pond conveniently located where petty offenders of various kinds were disciplined. The pond for the western part of London was what is now a portion of Trafalgar square. Charing Cross Many of the old ducking stools are still in existence as curiosities. In the days of their activity they were kept in the church porches, where they doubtless pointed a moral as to the naughty spirit which goeth before a fall.

The first colonists brought the institution to this country, although it never flourished in New England. In fact, there are no authentic records of the actual use of the ducking stool in these colonies, although a number of women were sentenced to be so punished. They had, however, other methods of treatment for ladies of a shrewish disposition, one of these being the wearing of a cleft stick upon the tongue.

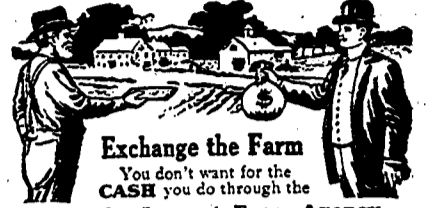
In the central and southern colonies the custom was quite popular. In the seventeenth century ducking stools were in every county in Maryland, and in 1775 one was placed at the confluence of the Ohio and Monongahela rivers. In Virginia the penalty was often employed, and in 1834 a Thomas Hartly of that colony wrote. It is said, to Governor Endicott of Massachusetts, giving a detailed account of a ducking administered to "one Betsey, wife of John Tucker, who by violence of her tongue had made his home and neighborhood uncomfortable." After describing the machine he adds: "Ye rope was slackened by ye officer, and ye woman was allowed to go down under ye water for ye space of half a minute. Betsey had a stout stomach and would not yield until she had allowed herself to be ducked five several times." After she promised to "stin no more" Betsey was untied and allowed to "walk home in her wetted clothes, a hopefully penitent woman."

The ducking stool prevailed longer in America than in England. In the old country it does not seem to have been used later than 1809, but in Georgia women were ducked for scolding as late as 1819. It is interesting to note that in 1824 a woman in Philadelphia was sentenced to be ducked, but the decree was not carried out, as it was "deemed obsolete and contrary to the spirit of the times." A writer on colonial customs states that one of the last indictments for ducking in this country was that of Mrs. Anne Royall in Washington, a lobbyist, who "became so abusive to congressmen that she was indicted as a common scold before Judge William Cranch and was sentenced by him to be ducked in the Potomac. She was, however, not subjected to the ducking indignity, but was released with a fine."—Bellman.

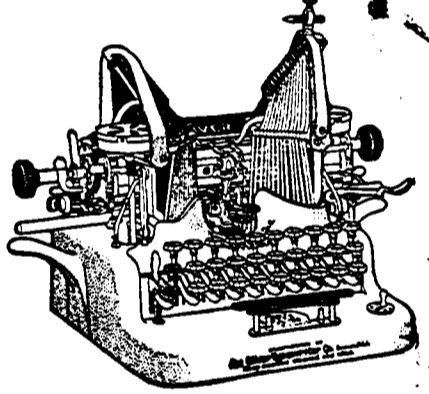

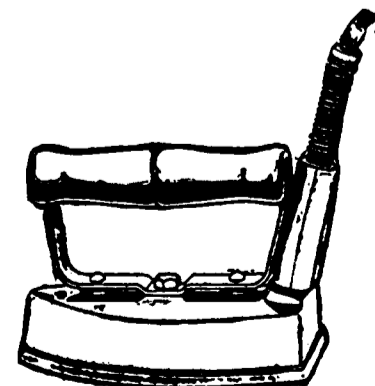

### Support Home Industries

[From The Implement Age]

Whenever a plan is suggested for the development of a town the first suggestion invariably is, "Bring in more industries." It is customary to throw out all sorts of inducements for the location of factories, including exemption from taxes for a time, free sites and bonuses, and these methods have contributed so much toward building up hundreds of prosperous municipalities that their wisdom cannot be questioned. Anything that will add to a population, that will give employment to men who support families and thus contribute to the general welfare, is at all times desirable.

But the people who join heartily in the work of bringing in new industries, and who show the greatest enthusiasm over this feature of the public work in which all good citizens share, sometimes are the first to forget that the new industries brought in and the old ones already there require continuous support and, failing to get it, become a hindrance rather than an aid to development.

We are apt to overlook, too, the fact that the home merchant is entitled to as much consideration as the factory which has been obtained by special effort. The merchant is a necessity—even more so than the factory; for who cares to live in a community where there are no stores, or where the stores are closed and barred and the merchants have moved away, forced to other fields by lack of patronage?

The retail store, properly conducted, is an industry that should have the support of every loyal citizen. Pride in the home town is measured by willingness to support its merchants and its industries.

It is not necessary to build a Chinese wall around a community—to refuse to buy outside when it can be done to advantage; but the man who will send away for something that he can buy at home on as good or better terms needs education and lacks loyalty. Sometimes unfortunately, the very one who should be least liable to this criticism, the local merchant, is given to sending abroad for things which he ought to buy from his neighbors. Then, again, there is the farmer who finds it easier to mail his order to a big city than to go to town. Often he is handicapped by bad roads, and thus has a valid excuse. But he ought to be able to buy by mail from his local merchants as safely and as advantageously as from some one at a distance with whom he has no acquaintance.

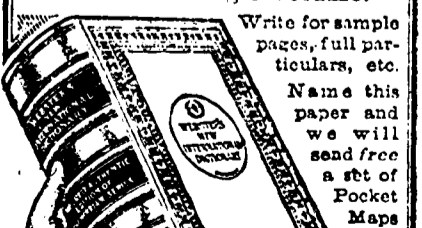

Whatever the sailors might think of such an order mattered little; obey they must. With all haste a messenger was sent ashore with a note, and the captain meanwhile paced the deck in silence awaiting the reply—a reply which meant life or death to him.

Finally the messenger returned carrying a bag of gold coins. That night the French cruiser weighed anchor and quietly steamed out into the Mediterranean, her captain happy that he had fared no worse and the authorities of Monte Carlo only too glad to be rid of so dangerous a visitor.—Washington Star.

## England's Uncrowned King.

## Methodist Sunday Schools Grow

Sunday schools in the Methodist church have scored a pronounced success the past two years under the leadership of Revs. David G. Downey and Edgar Blake. The growth of Sunday school missionaries has been from none to twenty six. Over eight hundred new schools have been formed, reaching about 30,000 pupils. Out of these 188 Methodist churches have been organized, and 59 buildings erected at a cost of over \$102,000. There are all to be more than 8,000,000 of children and youth in Methodist circles under eighteen years of age and 1,500,000 conversions have been reported in the last ten years, from their Sunday schools. More than 3500 teachers have been enrolled in training courses and 3750 adult Bible classes have been formed, with a membership of \$2,500. It is reported that the Methodist Sunday schools have gained since 1908 nearly 10,000 pupils.

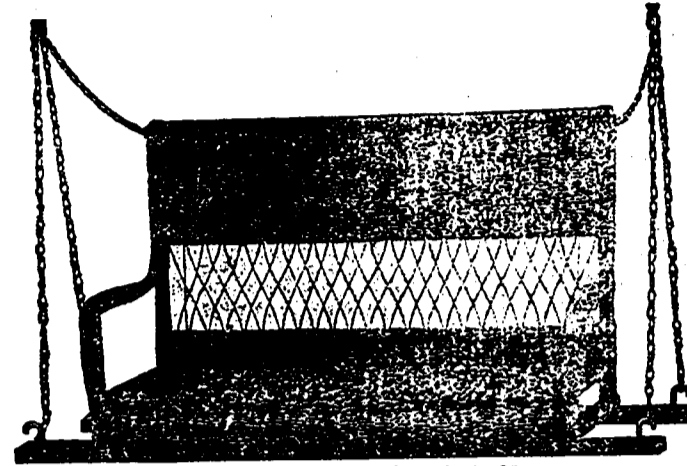
