OUR CONCORD LETTER

Matters of General Interest

Concord, N. H., Nov. 20.-Governor Bass oc cupied today for the winter the residence, which he has leased, of the late E. B. Woodworth, on School Street, in this city, and he expects to spend a large part of his time for the next few months in the executive offices at the State House. His first official engagement here is to speak at the banquet on Thursday which will follow the formal exercises of dedication of the magnificent building which Edward Tuck of Paris and Exeter has given as a home to the New Hampshire Historical Society. This is one of the great events of the year in the capital city and the oration by Congressman Samuel W. McCall is expected to be a historic document of importance. This building is a great addition to Concord's famous "civic center" which includes, also, the State House, State Lib rary, Federal Building, City Hall, Unitarian and Episcopal churches, opera house. Eagle Hotel, etc. And there is a persistent rumor that a wealthy citizen of Concord will still farther add to this array of fine structures a building to house our city public library.

On Saturday Governor Bass headed a delegation of two hundred people from Concord to the Dartmouth Harvard football game in the Cambridge, Mass., stadium.

Harry A. Gregg was named as police commissioner of Nashua, to succeed James B. Crowley. and Burleigh Roberts was nominated as special justice of the Lancaster police court. Governor Bass again submitted to the council the nomination of William B. Rotch of Milford as insurance commissioner and it was rejected by the same three to two vote as at a previous meating. then the sudden death of Insurance Commissioner Adams has altered the aspect of affairs.

The Governor has appointed Arthur W. Dud ley and H. E. Slayton of Manchester, Harry C. Hill of Concord and R. W. Barrett of Cornish as delegates to the American Roads Congress to be held at Richmond, Va. Henry M. Baker and George L. Whitford have been appointed delegates to the Rivers and Harbors congress at Washington early next month.

KEPT ABOVE GROUND.

Ingenious Way Major Hook Evaded the Terms of a Will.

Among ingenious ways of evading a will the plan followed by Major Hook and recorded in "Ancient, Curious and Famous Wills" may be commended:

A county newspaper some years ago recorded the death of a Major Hook and spoke of him as "a singular character." "He died." says the report, "on Monday sennight at his house, Ham street, Ham common. He was an officer in the East India company's service and reached the age of seventy-five. His house was remarkable for its dingy and dilapidated condition.'

His wife had become entitled to a life annuity, bequeathed to her in these ambiguous terms: "And the same shall be paid to her as long as she is above ground." When, therefore, the good lady died her husband very naturally objected to forfeit his income by putting her below ground and ingeniously devised a mode of keeping her in a room which he allotted "to her sole and separate use." placing a glass case over her remains. For thirty years he thus prolonged his enjoyment, if not of his wife's society, at least of her income.

Da Vinci's Writings.

Although Leonardo da Vinci was a voluminous writer, he never published a single line during his lifetime. After the master's death in France his manuscripts were taken back to Italy. His heirs proved unworthy, and the precious writings were gradually dispersed. Loose pages were often detached and were either given away as relics or stolen. No attempt was made to publish any of his treatises, except that on painting, for more than 300 years after his death. This was partly owing to the great difficulty of deciphering his handwriting. Da Vinci was left handed and always wrote in oriental fashion, from right to left. Besides this, his orthography is peculiar to himself. He abbreviates some words and joins others together and employs neither stops nor recents.-London Chronicle.



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

AIDED THE REVOLT

The Destruction of Portland, Me., In Colonial Days.

ACT OF AN ENGLISH OFFICER.

Royalist Woman's Wiles Caused the Annihilation of the City and Saved Portsmouth, N. H., For Which Portland's Fate Had Been Planned.

One of the causes of the Revolution-

but that the razing of this town, which had been peaceably inclined until then, incensed the colonies beyond measure. One prompt result was the immediate formation of a Maine regiment which was added to the meager forces of the Continental army.

Not so generally known, however, is the tradition that it was due to the fascinations of a beautiful woman that Portland was destroyed and another town preserved.

When the British commander, Captain Mowatt, on board his flagship, the Canceau, anchored with his fleet in Portland's inner harbor, he did not reyeal to her citizens that the unscrupulous little god of love had been his pilot. Instead, on a bright October morning in 1775, he ran up the royal ensign on his fleet and at 9 o'clock began a bombardment that lasted uninterruptedly until 6 o'clock at night. Portland was unprepared for such a visitation, and there was no attempt at defense, the inhabitants simply swarming the streets with their ox carts and horses and attempting to seek safety by flight to the open country back from the water front.

So close did the assailing vessels approach that under cover of the boinbardment they landed sailors who pervaded the town, setting fire to such buildings as had escaped damage from hot shot and exploding bombs. Before Captain Mowatt had completed the sacrifice he desired to lay before love's shrine three-quarters of the town was totally destroyed, including the municipal buildings, churches, public library, fire engine houses, warehouses, wharfs and shipping.

All that be left was a handful of the poorer hovels, every residence of importance being bombarded or set on fire and 5,600 inhabitants left shelteriess at the approach of winter. To make it practically certain that aid could not come to the seaport by water he destroyed all but one wharf and took with him on his departure all the vessels anchored in the harbor that had been spared from the torch.

Truly he had a glorious bonfire and in explanation he exhibited instructions which read: "Come opposite the town with all possible expedition, and there burn, sink and destroy," but the gossips of the time said that these orders originally related to Portsmouth. STRIPPED THE LOUVRE.

Restitution of Works of Art After Napoleon's Downfall. The Louvre has known a still blacket

day than that on which "La Giocondo" was abstracted. This was Sept. 23. 1815, when formal restitution had to be made of the pictures looted during the conquests of Napoleon. Commissioners attended from fourteen different states. The lion's share was obtained, curiously enough, by the representative of Cassel, who recovered no fewer than 421 pictures. Austria recovered 323. Spain 284. Holland 210 and Prussia 119. Altogether 2.065 pictures were removed, together with a number of statues, bas-reliefs. bronzes, wood carvings, cameos and enàmels.

Sir Walter Scott in his "Life of Napoleon" gives a graphic account of the removal of the masterpieces, which were being frantically copied by enthusiastic students until the last moment before their departure. Thanks to the exertions of Baron Denon, who was then director of the Louvre, a certain number of stolen pictures were retained, among these being the finest example of Paolo Veronese extant. "The Marriage at Cana." The gallery, however, was left with only 270 pictures and remained closed until the vacant spaces had been filled, mainly with the works of French artists .-Pall Mall Gazette.

TRESPASSING IN ENGLAND.

If No Damage is Done Intruders Need Have No Fear.

Many timid pedestrians in rural England are frightened away from inviting fields by the notice "Trespass ers Will Be Prosecuted" They need have no fear, says an English ex-

As the law stands any trespasser who does the smallest damage-injures a fence, breaks a small branch, etc.-can be summoned before a mag-Istrate and fined. But if he does no damage the landlord must bring an action at law and get an injunction. This costs a lot of money, and unless the trespusser is a man of means the landlord won't bring his action at law. All he can do otherwise is to ask you to get out. If you go peaceably you can return an hour later and repeat the visit as often as you wish. Nothing can be done beyond asking you to leave again. But if you resist then sufficient force can be used, and if you show fight you may be legally knocked down, your legs tied and your seif bundled on to the road

He can saw a bridge crossing a stream, so that you will get a ducking; he can dig a pit for you to fall into, and he can so fix the stile you are likely to cross that you will break it, and then he can have you up before the magistrate. 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
