ANTRIM'S PIONEER

Does Good Work and Has Proper Credit

Are we, the people of this town, as progressive as we ought to be? do we manifest the tact and push that we need, in order to work for the best interests and welfare of the town? Very few men can adapt themselves to all circumstances—they may adapt themselves to some circumstances but not all. Lazy, shiftless people have the poorest faculty to do this; enterprising, successful men can do it readily, for it is one of the conditions of success—so they must accept the situation day by day.

In the early history of our town, the sturdy pioneers came here and subdued the land, built their log cabin and laid the foundation for our go ahead town of Antrim.

We have here to day a pioneer: he came here like those men of old—to subdue the forest, till the soil, and to make a home for himself and family; he was endowed with tact, push and energy: the man to whom we refer is Mr. Paul W. Thayer. He bought land bordering on Lake Grege and extending to the summit of Patten hill; he made clearing; he built a cabin; he built more cabins; a restaurant; a stable and other buildings; he built a road; he adapted himself to the circumstances; he surveyed land for lots, sold them, on which cottages were built; he waded his road legally laid out; the town laid it out with metes and bounds. Mr. Thayer is a good sample of the kind of men we want to build up the town, open up the resources and keep us from having a chronic affection of sleeping lethargy. A few more pioneers of like nature which Mr. Thayer possesses, to co-operate with the town, would in due time have a road circling the lake and many cottages would be built on the shore, without doubt.

We hope that the town will vote to exempt Mr. Thayer's mill from taxation for a term of years. "Do unto others as you would have others do unto you." "Labor conquers everything." "Nothing ventured, nothing have."

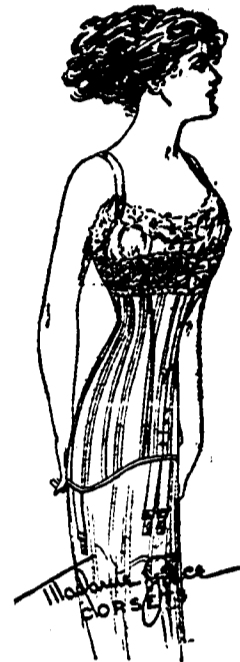

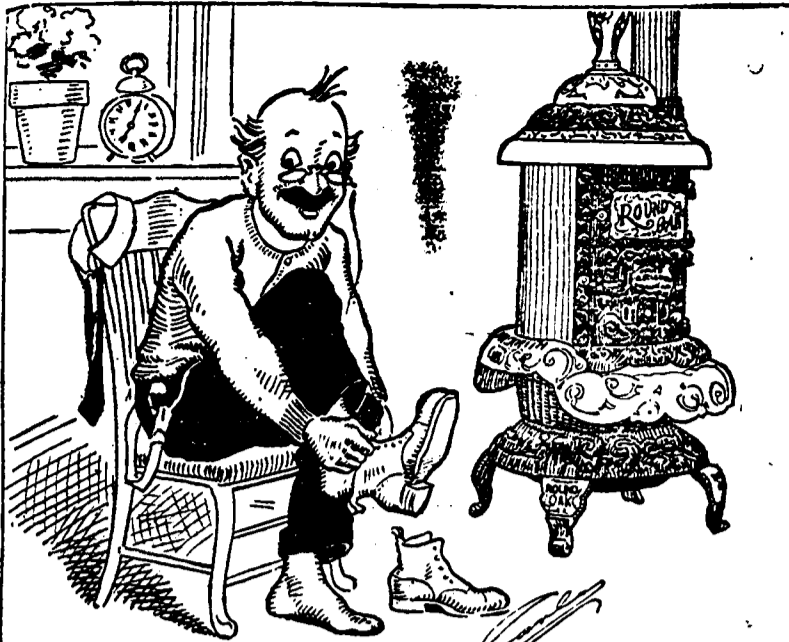
S. S. Sawyer, real estate agent, called on friends here the past week. He has a number of good bargains in this vicinity which will most likely change hands this spring.

Obituary

January twenty-eighth, Nathan Whitney passed away at his late home, Bennington, N. H., of which village he had been a resident for forty five years, aged 88 years, 6 months and 8 days, after an almost painless decay of bodily powers extending over some months, but keeping remarkably his mental faculties. He inherited a name widely scattered over the United States, and in its various branches long and favorably known in its history, and himself and home preserve the best traits of New England life. He was born in Westminster, Mass., of sturdy stock, one of four brothers, of whom one, the oldest, still survives. Like most Americans he pursued during his years in different places, a variety of occupations, among which were paper making, wood pulp manufacture, sash and doors and blinds, and extensive farming interests in the west. Through all, honest and industrious, he won success that gave a comfortable competence for his later days, and the satisfaction of helping on many good causes.

As a citizen he was always interested in the true welfare of the town. As a member of the

Congregational church he was constantly helpful and discharged faithfully for many years the offices of deacon and trustee.

He was twice married; first in 1851 to Mary S. Tolman who died in 1861. By this union there were a son and daughter, Frank E. and Carrie L., the former a physician in Rochester, N. H., and the latter the wife of Dr. C. H. Hadley of Brooklyn, N. Y. In 1864 he married Charlotte M. Belcher, still living, with whom he passed almost to the golden anniversary. To them were born two sons, William B. and Edward S., both successful lawyers, the former in New York, and the latter in Chicago.

To these, to the seven grandchildren, and to all his many friends he has bequeathed the "memory of the just" which the Bible declares "is blessed."

His life and memory will be a strong incentive and help to faithfulness, and his covenant, so honorably kept, a stimulus to us all to endure to the end.

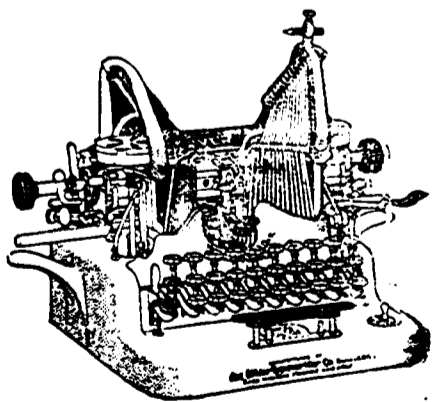
