SILAS G. WALLACE

A Native of Antrim and Life Long Resident Dies After a Brief Illness

Another of Antrim's aged and well known citizens has passed on from this life to the life beyond; this time we have to record the death of Silas Gardner Wallace, whose spirit took its flight on Sunday afternoon at three o'clock, at his home on Main street, after an illness of about three weeks. He was among our oldest residents and will be greatly missed.

Since the death of his wife, Mr. Wallace has resided at home in the family with his daughter, Mrs. E. E. George, who resided there, and who with her husband have given him every attention in his declining years. The cause of his death is said to have been an affection of the heart. In his active years, deceased was a hard working man and interested in the town's welfare, and much of the building in the village he had assisted in, being employed in foundation work and also wood working.

Mr. Wallace was son of John W. and Ann C. (Brackett) Wallace, and was born October 25th, 1834. Was twice married, his first wife being Sarah E. Roach who died in 1864; his second wife was Eliza J. Whitmore of Salisbury, who died four years ago. Deceased is survived by six children, two sons, George and Charles of Antrim, four daughters, Mrs. Anna George of Antrim, Mrs. Mary Packard of Littleton, Mass., Mrs. Estella Speed of Clinton, Mass., Miss Emma Wallace of Chelsea, Mass., and five grand-children, besides a brother, Judge E. A. Wallace, of Havana, Ill.

The funeral was held to day Wednesday from his late home.

Lower Tax Rate for Antrim

The Selectmen of Antrim have this year had an unusual task to perform and in many ways different from previous years, though not wholly unlike that of last year. Much revaluation had to be done, some readjustments were necessary, and a certain amount of new property come in for taxation. This has now all been completed and the tax rate been made; this was left at the March meeting in a way different from any previous year, and the rate had to be arrived at after the valuation was known. It has been decided that the tax rate shall be \$1.75 instead of \$2 as it has been for many years past, and it is figured that this will pay all appropriations including a thousand dollars on the town debt, and have a balance in the treasury at the end of the year. With the decrease in the tax rate and about half the usual tax within the precinct, notwithstanding the increase in valuation, one's total tax is practically what it has been in years past.

Nothing Strange

There is nothing strange or mysterious in the result of the primaries, says a Mass. exchange. Two great men appealed to the voters for their support. Both are men of unusual ability, strong character, and high ideals. Either is a safe leader for the republican party to follow. The strange thing would have been if either candidate had rolled up any considerable majority over his opponent. MEMORIAL DAY PROGRAMME

As Will be Carried Out in Antrim on Thursday, May the Thirtieth

Memorial Day will be observed in Antrim as follows: Ephraim Weston Post, No. 87, G. A. R., will leave Grand Army hall in carriages for North Branch Chapel at 7.30 a.m., arriving at North Branch Chapel at 9 a.m., where exercises will be held by citizens of that village. At the close of the exercises column will be formed under the direction of Squires Forsaith, marshal of the day, and proceed to the cemetery and decorate the graves of the soldiers in the usual manner.

Return to Antrim Centre and perform the usual service in the cemetery. Returning to Antrim for dinner, at 11.30 o'clock.

Soldiers' graves on Meeting House hill will be decorated by special detail of the Post, assisted by Daughters of the American Revolution. The East cemetery will be decorated by a special detail of the Post and the School children.

The route will be Main, Elm and Concord streets to Maplewood cemetery, where the following exercises will take place:

Dirge by Band.
Decoration of Soldiers' graves at sound of bugle.

Column will re-form and march via Concord street to Soldiers' Monument, where the exercises will be in charge of the Woman's Relief Corps, assisted by the School children.

Return to G. A. R. hall where the column will be dismissed.

All war veterans are invited to fall in with the Post.

Contributions of flowers are earnestly solicited, and may be left at Town hall on or before 9.00 o'clock Thursday. The ladies of the W. R. C. will have charge of the hall, wreaths and flowers.

Now, men and women of Antrim, and we mean by men and women, every one who is old enough to help in any way; we need your help, and we need it now, ARE YOU SPORTS, THE RIGHT KIND OF SPORTS, the kind who have an inherent desire and determination to do what you can for your town? We believe you are, and that on Monday evening, the 3rd day of June at 8 o'clock, we shall have at least 200 people in the town hall to discuss this matter who will go out filled with so much enthusiasm that we will next August make the first annual "Antrim Town Fair" such a day of sport and good fellowship as will be remembered for all time to come.
