## A Bit Too Conspicuous

Not for a number of years has it been necessary to mention the fact that boys using the swimming hole on Clinton street are a bit too bold in their antics while in swimming. Some of them may wear bathing suits or tights, but a number of boys that were noticed only a few days since upon a sawdust pile near by had nothing on, and were acting as if they were miles away from civilization.

Another place, at Clinton, on Gregg lake road near the Holt place, is quite well into the woods but not far enough to be out of sight of passers-by. Here too were noticed while driving along the road boys standing upon a large rock before dressing "drying off"—rather too conspicuous most of us would say.

A few years ago the authorities took a hand in this matter and conditions instantly improved. We have no idea that the boys are knowingly doing anything out of the way, and now that the matter has been called to their attention it is reasonably certain that there will be no further need of comment.

## Big Apple Crop in Prospect

Among the attractive prospects of the season is a phenomenal apple crop. We are now so far along that predictions can be made with approximate accuracy, and according to present estimates the country will produce between fifty and sixty million barrels, says the Boston Transcript. This will be more than twice the supply of a year ago and about seventy per cent in excess of the yield in 1912. It goes without saying that there is no other fruit that means so much for the comfort and enjoyment of the individual and the home as the apple. It is not an incidental, like many others which we appreciate in their seasons, but the staple of the table and the fireside. It is an influence for health as well as nourishing and comforting. We hope one significance of this bumper crop is that the growers and farmers of the country are paying more attention to orcharding, which rightly directed can be made one of our most profitable industries. We believe that there is a reflex movement from the far West which is influencing beneficially this enterprise. The natural conditions are as favorable in New England as anywhere in the world and we venture to say that no other crop, neglected to so great an extent as this has been in the past, in this section would have given so good an account of itself.

## Hillsboro at Antrim on Saturday

There is probably no team around here which crosses bats with Antrim on the base ball field, to create more of an interest, than does the Hillsboro team; they always have, and they doubtless always will. The ever-present rivalry has kept up the interest and we believe it is so today. Both teams carry good ball players, giving as a rule a nice exhibition of the national game.

These teams meet on Saturday of this week on Jameson grounds when it is expected and hoped that one of the best games seen this year will be pulled off. Our people like to see a good game and we predict some sport by attending this game. Further particulars will be noted on posters.

## Orchard Demonstration

The New Hampshire College and Experiment Station Extension Service will give an exhibition of its work in Antrim, in charge of Benjamin Richardson, Orchard Demonstrator for Hillsboro County. This demonstration in spraying will be given in the orchard owned by Charles S. Abbott, known as the Whitney orchard, on Friday of this week, July 31, at two o'clock in the afternoon. All who may be interested in any way in the care and management of orchards are most cordially invited to attend this demonstration.

## August 7 Time Limit

For filing nominations or depositing the required fee with the Town Clerk for such elective office as one might desire to be a candidate for at the primary, has a time limit, and that date is the 7th day of August; yet under certain conditions supplementary names may be added as late as August 11, but not thereafter.

The offices to be filled in this manner are representative to the general court, moderator, supervisors of the check list, and delegate to state convention.

Town Clerk Nay informs us that to date no one has filed his intention for either of these offices, but it is a safe guess that on or before August 7 the list will be comfortably filled.

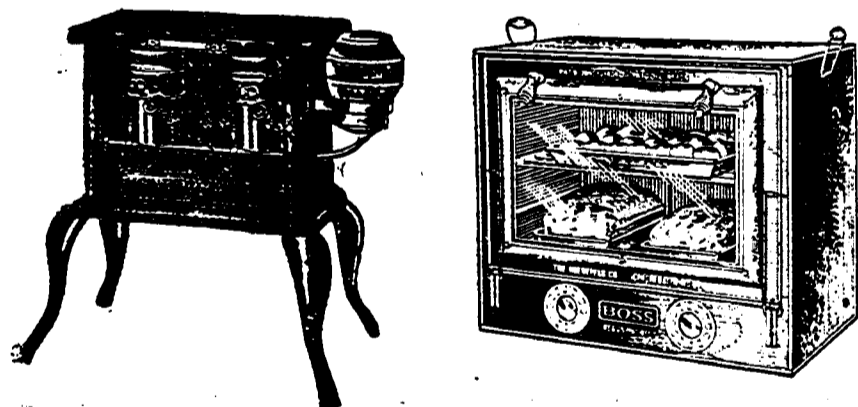
