# A Bit Too Conspicuous

Not for a number of years has it been necessary to mention the fact that boys using the swimming hole on Clinton street are a bit too bold in their antics while in swimming. Some of them may wear bathing suits or tights, but a number of boys that were noticed only a few days since upon a sawdust pile near by had nothing on, and were acting as if they were miles away from civilization.

Another place, at Olinton, on Gregg lake road near the Holt place, is quite well into the woods but not far enough to be out of sight of passers by. Here too were noticed while driving along the road boys standing upon a large rock before dressing "drying off"rather too conspicuous most of us would say.

# Big Apple Crop in Prospect

Among the attractive prospects of the season is a phenomenal apple crop. We are now so far along that predictions can be made with approximate accuracy, and according to present estimates the country will produce between fifty and sixty million barrels, says the Boston Transcript. This will be more than twice the supply of a year ago and about seventy per cent in excess of the yield in 1912. It goes without saying that there is no other fruit that means so much for the comfort and enjoyment of the individual and the home as the apple. It is not an incidental, like many others which we appreciate in their seasons, but the staple of the table and the fireside. It is an influence for health as well as nourishing and comforting. We hope one significance of this bumper crop is that the growers and farmers of the country are paying more attention to orcharding, which rightly directed can be made one of our most profitable industries. The natural conditions are as favorable in New England as anywhere in the world and we venture to say that no other crop, neglected to so great an extent as this has been in the past, in this section would have given so good an account of itself.

# August 7 Time Limit

# Expert Says Cockreach Can Live for Five Years.

David Fairchild Writes About the Rip Van Winkles, the Jekylis and Hydes, and the Aeronauts of the Insect World.

Washington.-The Rip Van Winkles, the Jekylls and Hydes, the aristocrats, the philosophers and the "hoboes" of the insect world are described in a communication to the National Geographic society, by David Fairchild, the plant explorer, who has scoured the world for plants of economic value and introduced them into the United States.

In describing the peculiar habits and remarkable achievements of insects, he says the champion aeronaut is the king grasshopper, which has the ability to jump 100 times its length. It can also sail for 1,000 miles before the wind. These grasshoppers sometimes go in such numbers that they make a cloud 2,000 square miles in extent.

"Its great front lip hides a pair of jaws as effective as a haychopper, and it has an appetite as voracious as that of a hippopotamus," writes Mr. Fairchild. "A young chick finds itself shut inside the egg-shell and must work its way out alone, but the young grasshoppers find themselves-the whole nestful-shut in a hardened case in the ground made by their mother, and it takes a half dozen of them working together to dislodge the lip which shuts them in.

The carrying power of the song of the cricket is extraordinary; there are species whose strident notes can be heard for a mile, although their little bodies are scarcely more than an inch in length. The males alone are musical, and it is reasonable to suppose, since the females have ears in their forelegs, that the males are singing to their mates and not to mankind. As one listens to their friendly song it is hard to appreciate what fighters they are among themselves, the larger ones even turning cannibals when food is scarce.

"Of all creatures of our houses, the cockroach is the most detested. Housewives may be surprised to learn that a cockroach can live five years, and that it takes a year to develop to maturity. The female lays her eggs in a horny capsule like a spectacle case, which she carries about with her until she is ready to deposit it in a suitable place. Later she returns to help her baby cockroaches out of their shells."

The insects known as moth-slayers, which have been brought here from other lands to aid in the work of ex-Rermination, are said to be slaughtering the moths by wholesale and thriving at their sanguinary task.

One of the most noteworthy of the alien insects, and one which has been most active in the slaughter, is a green beetle, a veritable tiger in the moth world!



"Why folks are always seeking an old maid's views on matrimony is something that I could never understand. But it seems to me to be

Queen Victoria in the Films.

A new moving picture spectacle entitled "Victoria, Sixty Years a Queen." which for some time has been on view in London, is now in this country. This elaborate picture not only embraces the main incidents in the life of Queen Victoria, but illustrates important events in England's history during the sixty years of her reign. It is given in seven sections, comprising two hundred and eighty-nine scenes. These scenes include Victoria's notification, when sixteen years old, of her ascension to the throne, her coronotion at Westminster abbey, the meeting with the prince consort, he: wedding, the christening of the prince of Wales, the attempt on her life in Hyde park the Indian mutiny, the death of the prince consort, the wedding of the prince of Wales, the queen's meeting with Charles Dickens, cabinet meetings presided over by Benjamin Disraeli, General Gordon's last stand at Khartum, his death, and other events up to Victoria's death in 1900. Three actresses portrayed the queen at different stages.

### For Federal Censorship.

The Christian Science Monitor of Poston, which wields a wide editorial influence, is in favor of the proposed federal censorship, because it believes that it is "a step that would make for centralization, compactness, and fixed responsibility." Most likely such a step would be, as the Monitor continues, "welcomed by all respectable film producers and motion picture houses" if, and the "if" could well go in capital letters, there could be any assurance that a federal board would

retard the mushroom-like growth of censor bodies all over the country. But we are afraid the federal idea is somewhat late in its birth; too many small boards have already tasted the joys of minding other people's morals, too i

many acgisiators are ready to create new jobs, while making good campaign material. No, there will be ninety-andnine censor boards whether there is one labeled "federal" or not. And meanwhile the poor picture straggles along its trouble-beset route.

### New Source of Paper Pulp. A new source of paper pulp is said to have been discovered in a fibrous plant of the ginger family having its origin in India, but growing in trop ical parts of Asia, Africa and America The members of this family have fibrous stalks of various heights. ranging up to two feet six inches or more, and covered with leaves. From the dry fiber a very good pulp is obtained, one hectare of land yielding 14 tons of fiber. The cultivation de manded is inexpensive, and there are two or three harvests a year. The process of treatment is simple: The plant is cut, pressed between rollers to dry it, beaten and then heated with a varying proportion of soda. It may be broken instead of beaten, but in this case the quality of the paper is sacrificed somewhat, but it is rendered much more durable.

Classifying a "Sissy."

The most cutting bit of repartee we remember to have heard in recent weeks happened out at the Willoughbeach picnic of a certain fraternity to which we belong. A very young man and a very pretty girl were discussing costumes, horseback riding, golf and fudge. The girl said that she could ride, but preferred the old-fashioned side-saddle. ### Scotch Oil Ficid.

Mining for oil is peculiar to Scotland, for there are no oil wells in the Scottish field. The oil is not even fluid, but exists in a shale formation. This shale is almost as black as coal and lies at a depth of about 400 feet below the earth's surface. The oil shale is mined just as coal is mined, the rock is crushed into small pieces in crushing works similar to coalbreakers, and the crude oil is squeezed out of the small pieces of shale much as water is squeezed out of a sponge. One ton of shale yields an average of 14 gallons of oil. The oil field in Scotland lies between Glasgow and Edinburgh, known as the West Calder field, and the deposits of oil-producing shale are said to be practically inexhaustible.

"Why? Are you afraid av yer boss?




