SAW MILL BURNED

Sunday Evening's Fire Totally Destroyed Property

One of the most spectacular fires that has visited our town in a long time was the burning of the Goodell Company saw mill on Depot street, on Sunday evening, between the hours of seven and eight o'clock. The amount of dry wood and other material which naturally collects in a building of this kind made the flames leap up in the air to a considerable height and the sparks were carried a long distance.

Hardly was the fire noticed and the alarm given before the entire building appeared to be a mass of flames and nothing could be done to save it. The fire department reported in quick order, and had streams of water playing on adjoining property in a short space of time. The new Antrim House, within a short distance of the burning property and in the direct wake of the flying embers being carried by a brisk wind, was in considerable danger and continually held the close attention of the firemen. Other homes and buildings near by were also in danger and were well watched, but no damage other than water in the hotel was the result.

Everybody was on the street and as interested as they could possibly be. The early evening hour and the recent rains were of great assistance in preventing the spread of the fire to adjoining property.

The saw mill was rebuilt in the early '80s and had been kept in good repair; was used continually and the Goodell Company for some years past had been making their packing boxes there. Temporarily they have accepted a kind offer to make these boxes at the Abbott shop at Clinton. The cause of the fire is not known, but it is thought to have started around the boiler room. The building was valued around \$10,000.

What Becomes Of The License Fees?

Forty-eight States collected \$152,367,023 in 1922 as receipts from automobile license fees. The cost of collection, the cost of the plates themselves, and other expenses was less than four million dollars, so that a total of \$148,750,000 was left as the net receipts to be spent on highways.

This sum is divided into appropriations for State highway departments, 16 millions; Federal aid funds, 34 millions; construction of other than Federal aid roads, 6½ millions; maintenance of other than Federal aid roads, 21½ millions; and given as aid to counties, 25½ millions.

New Hampshire collects the largest revenue per individual car or truck, getting an average of \$25.73 each, while Arizona is easiest upon car owners from the license standpoint obtaining but \$5.69 each.

Instructions for Making Income Tax Returns

The following statement is issued from the office of the State Tax Commission, by John G. Marston, Director of Taxation of Interest and Dividends: In a previous statement information as to who should file returns was given, and the tax payers were instructed to make their returns before March 15, 1924 of taxable income received between May 4, 1923, and December 31, 1923, both dates included.

In this return, with the exceptions noted below, should be included all interest received on bonds, notes, money at interest however paid and all debts due the person to be taxed.

Do NOT include in your return interest received on savings bank deposits in any savings bank, building and loan association or savings deposit of any loan and trust company in this state, or in those of Maine, Vermont, Massachusetts or Connecticut.

Do NOT include in your return interest on bonds, notes or other obligations of the United States, or on bonds, notes or other obligations of this state or of any of its political subdivisions issued prior to May 4, 1923.

With the exceptions noted below, include all dividends on shares of all corporations and joint stock companies organized under the laws of this state or of any other state, territory or nation.

Do NOT include stock dividends paid in new stock of corporations issuing the same. Do not include dividends on shares of any state or national bank, savings bank, building and loan association or trust company doing business in New Hampshire.

With the exceptions noted below, include all dividends on the shares of partnerships, associations or trusts the beneficial interest in which is represented by transferable shares.

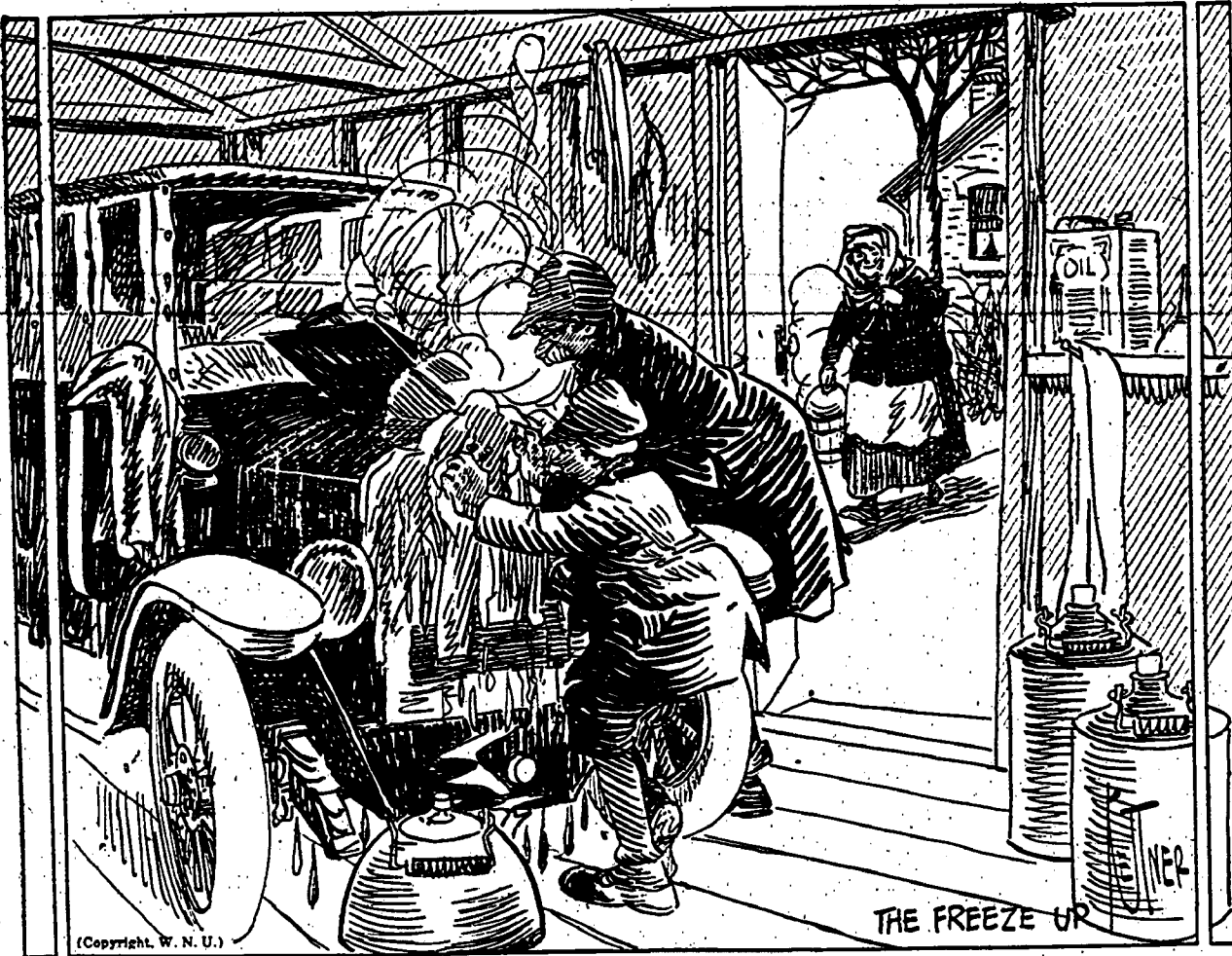
Do NOT include stock dividends paid in new stock of partnerships, associations or trusts issuing the same.

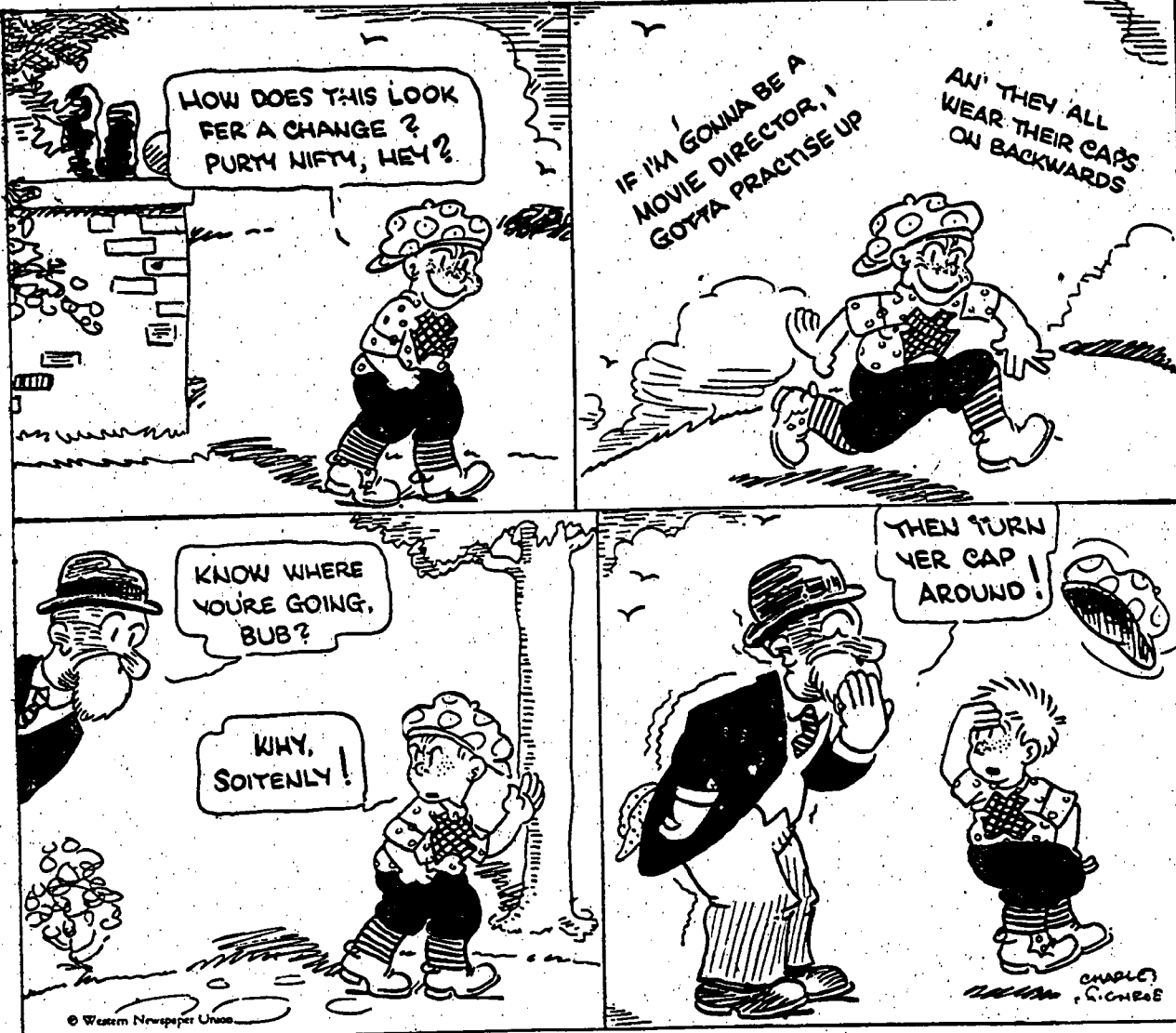

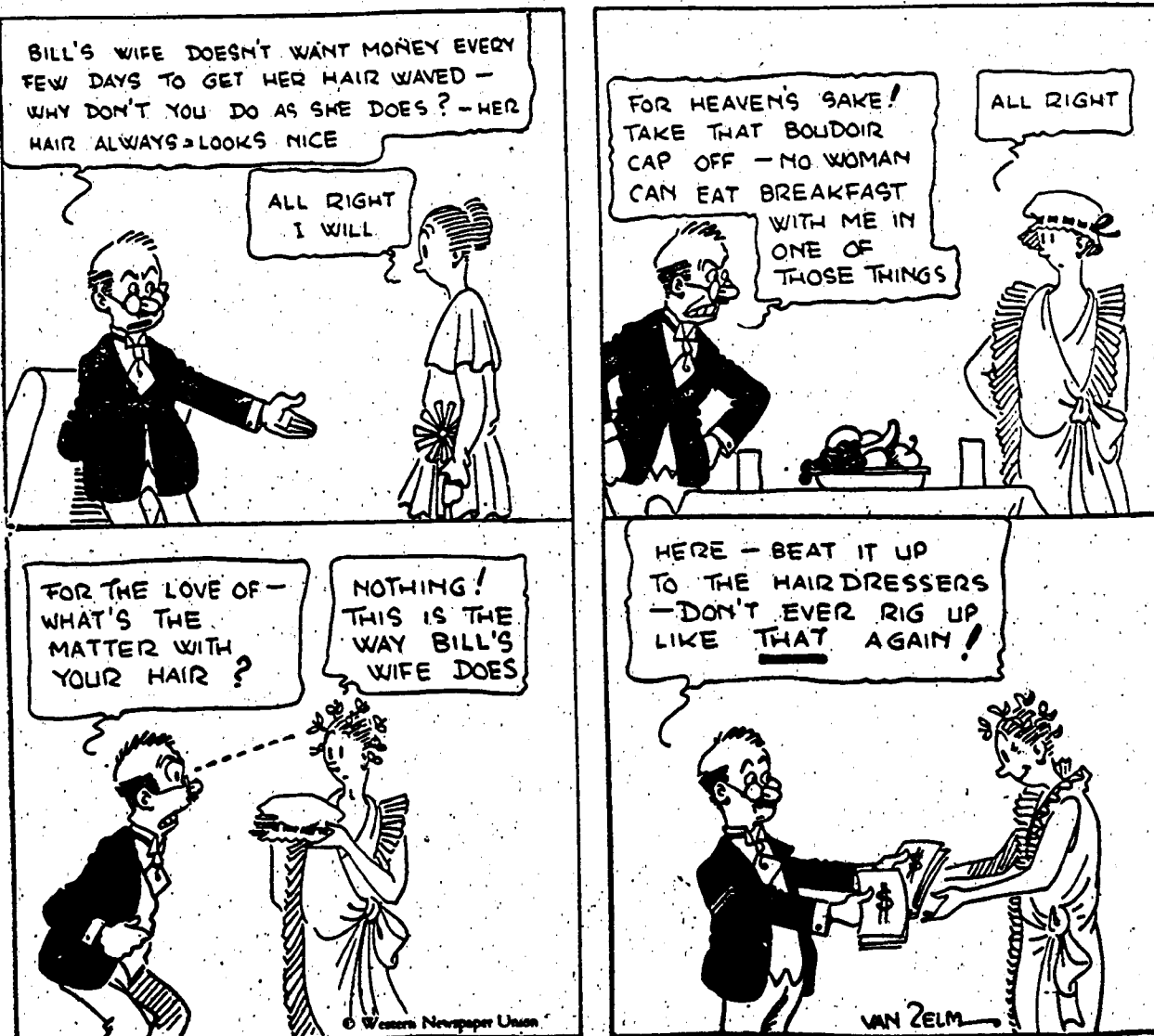

NEW HAMPSHIRE STATE NEWS

Republican Win in Keene
Robert T. Kingsbury was re-elected mayor and Dr. Clarence A. Wright police commissioner in the Keene election.

Awarded Varsity Letters
Sixteen members of the University of New Hampshire football squad are awarded the coveted varsity letters, it is announced by the executive committee of the athletic association.

N. H. Chamber Plans State Publicity
Committees to work out a plan for state publicity and to propose a general program have been authorized by the New Hampshire chamber of commerce. It was decided to have the annual meeting Jan. 9.

Attempts Suicide to Avoid Working
Despondent because of an ultimatum by his father that he must go to work, John Grigas of Nashua attempted suicide by drinking iodine. At St. Joseph's hospital where he was taken the stomach pump was used to such good effect that he suffered only slight burns from the fiery liquid.

Democrats Win in Portsmouth
The Democrats made a sweep in the Portsmouth election, electing the mayor, four councilmen-at-large, four of the five ward councilmen, a member of the board of assessors and a member of the board of public works, securing control of the last two bodies for the first time in many years.

Good Percentage Teaching
Forty-five members or one-third of the class of 1923 of the University of New Hampshire are now teaching. Although there is need of more teachers for our schools throughout the country, the class of 1923 feels that it has done its share in sending so large a portion of its members into the profession.

N. H. Lumbermen Told Surplus Fixes Price

H. H. Sturgis, president of the Maine Lumbermen's Association, and George C. McIlwain, representing the Dabson Statistical organization of Wellesley Hills, Mass., spoke in Manchester at the third annual meeting of the New Hampshire Lumbermen's Association. Mr. Sturgis declared that more lumber is being cut now than can be absorbed and there is a surplus which hestablisthes the price. He urged lumbermen to wait for a balance between consumption and production in order to gain a fair price.

Good Times Ahead For the Farmer

A membership of 30,289 was reported in the New Hampshire State Grange by State Secretary George R. Drake, at the opening session of the 50th annual convention of the order in Manchester. State Master Sawyer, in his annual address endorsed the farmers' co-operative movement as the principal hope of agriculture in New England. He especially urged the development of New Hampshire's water powers. It is said that the convention was the largest ever held in this state.

On the matter of transportation, the master said that last year in New Hampshire the steam railroads were taxed \$977,000, of which 26 per cent went to support highways for automobiles and not one cent for railroad grade crossings. He estimated that motor trucks, competing with the railroads, carried in this state last year over 11,000,000,000 pounds of freight on the capacity of 334,826 freight cars of 30,000 pounds capacity each.

The remedy he suggested for what he claimed is unfair treatment of the railroads, is regulation by the State Public Service Commission of motor trucks engaged in freight transportation.

He urged larger appropriations for the University of New Hampshire to provide for expansion of its operations and to raise the money, he suggested a special tax for the next 10 years for university purposes. He also urged more trained teachers in the public schools in rural districts and to provide these teachers, he recommended more support for the state normal schools.

He appealed to grangers to uphold the 18th amendment of the Constitution, to work for proper observances of the Sabbath and for an honest solution of the railroad problem.

"Electricity in the farm home and on the farm for light, power and in some degree possibly heat, would produce a most beneficial and salutary effect on our country life."

Secretary George R. Drake reported that there are at present 30,289 members of subordinate granges in New Hampshire and 11,456 members of Pomona granges, a slight decrease from last year but a "creditable showing considering that the rural population is decreasing."

At Cost To Big Families

Encouragement of large families and thrift is provided for in a newly formed corporation, which has filed its papers with Secretary of State Sawyer. The corporation is known as the Chase Family Home Association with headquarters in Manchester. The object of the corporation is "for the general purpose of building houses designed for one family only and selling the same without profit to American citizens having not less than two children." The officers of the association will work without pay.

Gasoline Tax Nets N. H. \$160,000 in 5 Months

State Treasurer Farrand has estimated the receipts from the one-cent gasoline tax in November would reach \$22,000, bringing the total tax paid since it became effective July 1, to approximately \$160,000. The gas tax for October was \$30,999.50.

Motor Cars Kill 50 This Year

Commissioner Griffin of the state motor vehicle department has announced there have been 50 fatal automobile accidents in New Hampshire this year. Manchester had the largest number, 11. Mr. Griffin said the registration thus far are 59,920. The department has begun sending out 1924 registration numbers.

High School Girl Of 16 A Suicide

Gertrude Hepps, 16-year-old Groveton high school girl took her own life according to medical evidence. It was reported that the girl died of a bullet wound she could not have inflicted on herself, because of the angle, though a discharged weapon was found at her side. The autopsy showed that she could have killed herself and undoubtedly did.

Grants Two Christmas Pardons

Christmas pardons were granted by Gov. Brown and the executive council to Mrs. Katherine B. Marston of Manchester and William Morrison of Toronto. Both were recommended by the prison trustees.

Mrs. Marston was sentenced in May, 1922, to serve not less than five nor more than seven years. She was charged with 50 burglaries in Manchester apartments and residences over a period of a year.

Morrison has served one-half of a sentence of 15 to 20 years for burglary.

University of New Hampshire

A sample of Thortveitite, a mineral so rare that few museums have specimens, has been obtained by Professor Charles James, head of the department of chemistry of the University of New Hampshire, and an expert in rare minerals. Thortveitite, which is gray in color and prismatic in formation, has been found in Norway and recently in Madagascar. Professor James' sample comes from Madagascar.

Professor James is carrying on extensive research work with another rare element, Germanium, which because of its ability to increase the red corpuscles of the blood, is used in cases of anaemia. Germanium was first obtained from silver in Germany, later was found in southwest Africa, and very lately in Utah.

To Extent Fight On Tuberculosis

Dr. Robert B. Kerr, executive secretary of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association, in his annual report said the 1924 budget calls for \$50,000, an increase of \$17,000 over the receipts for 1923. The additional money is required to make possible the placing of four more nurses in the field, the 11 now employed being insufficient to handle the work of the association.

Dr. Kerr declares the death rate in New Hampshire from tuberculosis has been reduced 40 per cent in the last three years, the period in which the association has been carrying on a state wide campaign. In 1918 there were 470 deaths from tuberculosis and in 1922 this has been reduced to 306.

Seek to Preserve Historic Spots in White Mountains

Officials of the state forestry department and Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests conferred with Henry Richardson, treasurer of the Profile and Flume Hotel Company, on measures for the preservation of Franconia Notch. The placing of 6000 acres, within which are the Old Man of the Mountain, the Flume, Profile lake, Echo lake and nine miles of forest lands along the Daniel Webster highway, in the market by the hotel company, is taken as a serious threat against these famed natural attractions of the White mountain section.

Those present at the conference included President Allen Hollis of the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests, Forester Phillip T. Ayres, ex-Gov. Rolland H. Spaulding, ex-Gov. Robert P. Bass and Capt. John G. Winant, members of the executive committee of the society, State Forester Foster and Commissioners John P. Corlis and James B. Murdoch of the state forestry department.

Mr. Ayres, following the conference, said this situation is one giving much concern to those interested in the preservation of the state's natural resources, the placing of the large tract up for sale, constituting a real menace to some of the choicest bits of New Hampshire mountain scenery. Mr. Ayres said that several estimates on the tract are being made, including lumber operators, and that the society is bent on preventing the spoliation of the lakes. The value of the tract runs into big figures, neither Mr. Ayres nor any of the other conferees being willing to state the amount.

14 Hunters Lose Rights

William J. Callahan, state fish and game warden, has taken away the licenses of 14 hunters in New Hampshire. The hunters were found carrying loaded shotguns or rifles in automobiles and teams. The licenses were suspended for at least 15 days. During the open season on deer the practice of carrying a loaded gun in a vehicle is reported to be quite common and is extremely dangerous for the man who does it as well as the general public.
