### TWO ANTRIM BOYS TO ARRIVE IN FRISCO DEC. 22

Sgt. Paul F. Dunlap of Pleasant Street, Antrim, N. H. is on his way home.

Dunlap is one of 1000 high-point Army veterans whom the "Magic Carpet" is bringing back to the States abroad the U.S.S. Miataka.

Also on the Miataka is T/4 Sidney A. Huntington, son of Mrs. Hattie Huntington of Depot St.

The U.S.S. Miataka — one of more than 250 carriers, battleships, cruisers, and attack transports in the Navy's famed "Magic Carpet" fleet — left Saipan, December 1, and is scheduled to arrive in San Pedro about December 22.

Passengers will go directly to the Separation Centers nearest their homes to complete the formalities of obtaining their discharges before returning to civilian life.

### UNION POMONA GRANGE HAS ANNUAL MEETING



covered with gifts for all the families in the community, who exchanged gifts that way. Then there was the year I taught the Centre school and had charge of the program at church and presented a play written by my friend, Ethel Chapman. The Morgans, Joneses, Eatons and Powers were the actors. They, nor I can ever forget the delicious smell of those balsam trees when we entered the church.

I will remember one winter in Wyoming, the little barn-like Methodist Church, largely supported by missions, had no minister, but three of us kept the Sunday School going. At Christmas we had a cantata but I had laryngitis. I learned then, that children well trained could be depended upon for a good performance. It was hard to find Christmas trees in that treeless country, but I got one of the few shipped in for my first grade school of 13 different nationalities. After school, the tree trimmed for the evening, then was taken to the church and when the Sunday School party was over, it went to my room. There were two little girls in the family. We grown-ups spent half the night trimming it again and the children were up at five o'clock and wide-eyed with amazement to discover the tree.

Christmas at school in Illinois was always fun, too, especially the music. As choir director, the music was even a greater joy. There were special church services, singing carols around the community Christmas tree in the park, then up and out at five o'clock with the choir singing carols to shut-ins on Christmas morning. Then we were all served breakfast by two ladies of the church.

I spent the Christmas of 1918 in a Nashua hospital where much was done for my happiness. All the rest have been happier in Hillsboro. Highlights of these last years have been the play I wrote for the neighborhood children to give in my room. Mabel Flanders Todd was the heroine, Roger McClintock, Santa Claus, Maud Sleeper Johnson was the "Christmas Package," Olive and Elgin Colby, "Peace and Goodwill," William Bennett, Santa Claus, Jr., who came by plane, and several others.

Then there were several children.

**CHRISTMAS IN EUROPE**

It is impossible to pick up a paper without reading another version of the starvation that is Europe. In central Europe, in conquered and liberated countries the sight of men, women and children dying daily is so commonplace as to evoke almost no emotion from occupying forces, living well in the midst of starvation.

To select only one of the many indications of the despoilation that is Europe, one can quote from General Eisenhower's statement asking support of UNRRA. "World War II," he said, "has left most of Europe prostrate. Many cities have been devastated beyond imagination and are a shambles of roofless walls of rubble."

To this can be added the account of how people live—if that is the word—in Europe today. Director General H. Lehman of UNRRA said on Thanksgiving Day: "Tonight in ruined Warsaw nearly a million men, women and children are living in squalid holes and dug-outs—without food, without fuel or warm clothing, or sanitation. This month, in which we celebrate Thanksgiving in America, 10,000 people will die of starvation and disease."

In a world which has experienced the horror of war, this assault on the senses has become almost a part of the natural order of things. And in a certain sense, it has been natural. For the world before the war was not precisely a happy place. Even the United States, physically better endowed than any country, was one-third ill-housed, ill-clad, and ill-fed.

The world that ushered in the war was one in which class divisions were sharp and well-defined. The wealth and power of the world were concentrated in the hands of a few; in capitalist countries, capitalism and its government prevailed; in Russia, a new despotism, communism was consolidating its power. No basic changes have been made.

The war has rendered a vast section of the world a slum. Even more disheartening is the fact that, far from attempting to aid the reconstruction of Europe, the Allies watch it wither. The transport, mining and industrial system of Europe has been wrecked by war. Only supplies from America can keep great numbers of European men, women and children from literally freezing and starving to death this winter.

The American Government has not met this moral obligation, and shows no signs of meeting it. Lend-lease has been cancelled, UNRRA relief is admitted to be grossly inadequate. It is up to individual Americans to do what they can to help their starving fellow human-beings abroad. Food packages can be mailed to Europe. Each of us can express our sympathy and fraternity with our fellows in Europe by mailing food packages.

What is more fitting during this Christmas season than to remember that we are our brothers keeper by sending Christmas packages to our European brothers.
