

NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Your attention is called to Section 1, Chapter 96, Phamphlet Laws

of 1925, which reads as follows:

Every owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually, on or before the thirtieth day of April, cause it to be registered, numbered, described and licensed for 1 year from the first day of the ensuing May, in the office of the clerk of the city or town wherein said dog is kept, and shall cause it to wear around its neck a collar distinctly marked with its registered number."

Said tag shall be furnished by the Clerk at the expense of the city or town from the amount received from dog license fees.
