## Resuscitator Purchase Decided At Bennington

**BENNINGTON** — With interested persons present from Hancock, Wilton, Greenfield, Peterboro and Antrim, as well as Bennington, a demonstration of a dual resuscitator was held at Bennington Town Hall.

This is the same type of machine as one at Police Headquarters in Concord. One of these resuscitators has now been ordered by the Bennington committee. Frederick S. Sheldon, Charles Lindsay and Arthur Sawyer.

The cost will be \$600, which includes six tanks of oxygen such as were furnished from Antrim, Bennington, Hillsboro, Peterboro and East Jaffrey during the recent tragic fire here. At that time resuscitators from Antrim and Peterboro were used and one from East Jaffrey was in reserve.

The committee, after working as solicitors for several days, has secured about \$400 and is continuing the work.

The Bennington Fire Department started the subscription list with a contribution of \$50 from its own resources, and gifts have been received from Greenfield and Peterboro.

A local group of men and women will be trained in its proper use.

The committee in charge of collecting the funds for the resuscitator reported this evening, Tuesday, that the donations are coming in well, but the goal of \$600 has not been reached yet. However, they are confident that with the pledges that have been given and donations yet to come, the required sum will be accumulated. Kindly see that Frederick Sheldon, Charles Lindsay or Arthur Sawyer receive your donation this week if you desire to contribute to this cause. It is to benefit you and yours, not just a favored few, that this machine is to be purchased.

Won't you do your share? As a community we have always pulled together, giving of our time, our strength and our dollars for all worth while projects. The purchasing of this resuscitator is indeed a worth while project, something in which the whole community may share. Dig deep, your dollars may save a life.

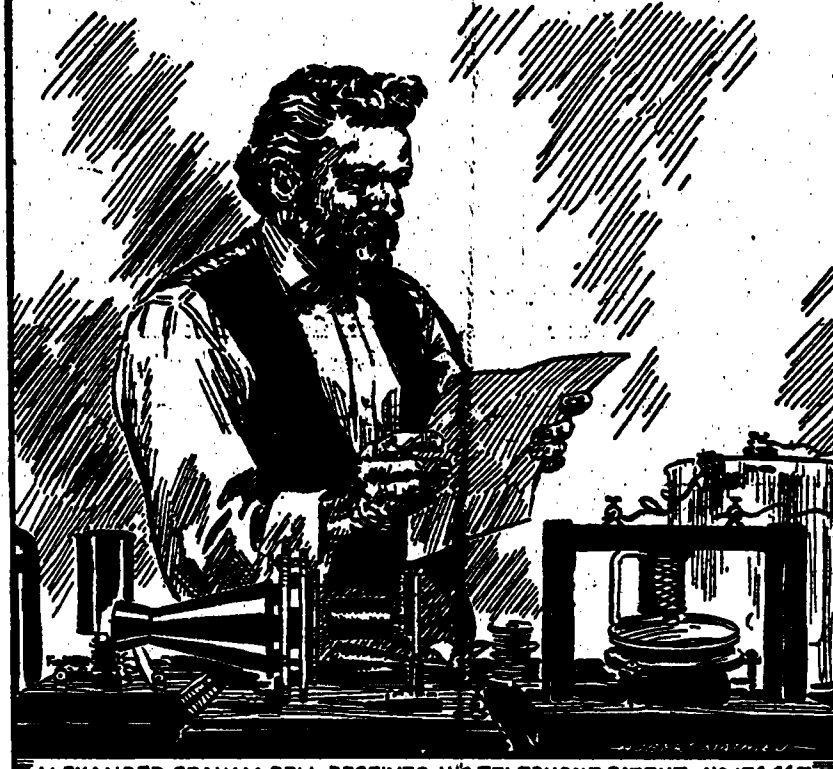

### A Lower Village Story

## THE MEDICINE MAN

The medicine man pitched his tent, arranged his bottles in orderly rows on the top of a box, placed his two pair of forceps beside the phial of "pain killer", then stepped outside to announce he was ready to extract a tooth.

The medicine man who was called "Doctor", came yearly to our village, and took up his tent residence on the land now owned by Mr. Jeremiah Doyle. This small acreage borders the road and in recent years has been converted into a vegetable garden.

It was a gala day when the "Doctor" made his appearance, for then our village teemed with excitement, curiosity and faith, faith in the magical power of the medicine man. The "Doctor" was vibrant, dominating and gifted with a persuasive quality of voice of such intensity that when he announced the free, painless extraction of a tooth not a person doubted the veracity of his words. During his sojourn of a week he did a thriving business.

The "Doctor" was a show man. A little troupe of players travelled with him and staged an entertainment mediocre, taudy and not too elevating but Oh! how thrilling to those who sat on hard narrow boards and applauded the sincere efforts of the actors.

The coming of the medicine man was an event, for to his admirers no one could extract a tooth as well as he. No one could talk as he did. This was true for during the operation words poured from the "Doctor's" mouth, as a brook in summer flows through a meadow, gently, persistently and in moderate rate of speed. But once the tooth

was extracted the "Doctor's" voice took on the sound of a booming cataract.

"Out, young man, out, he would shout," "Here it is, young man in my forceps, a three pronged molar, decayed, putrid, seething in putrefaction. Another month, another week, no, another day, and this tooth would have filled your system with poison. That poison, young man, would have seeped into your veins, clogged the blood stream, paralyzed the circulation and snapped the thread of life." With these last words the "Doctor" made a sound with his fingers that was like the cracking of something very dry and brittle, but to his fascinated audience it was indeed the snapping of the thread of life.

"This was not to be, young man", continued the "Doctor", "You were not to die, you were to live." The travelling "Doctor" was to extract that tooth, and so prolong your

### NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Your attention is called to Section 1, Chapter 96, Plamphlet Laws of 1925, which reads as follows:

"Every owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually, on or before the thirtieth day of April, cause it to be registered, numbered, described and licensed for 1 year from the first day of the ensuing May, in the office of the clerk of the city or town wherein said dog is kept, and shall cause it to wear around its neck a collar distinctly marked with its registered number."

Said tag shall be furnished by the Clerk at the expense of the city or town from the amount received from dog license fees.

The above law will be strictly enforced by Police Dept. All Dog Licenses Expire May 1. Please Take Notice

The service says that they might recommend some sort of an open season but the bag limit may be very small.

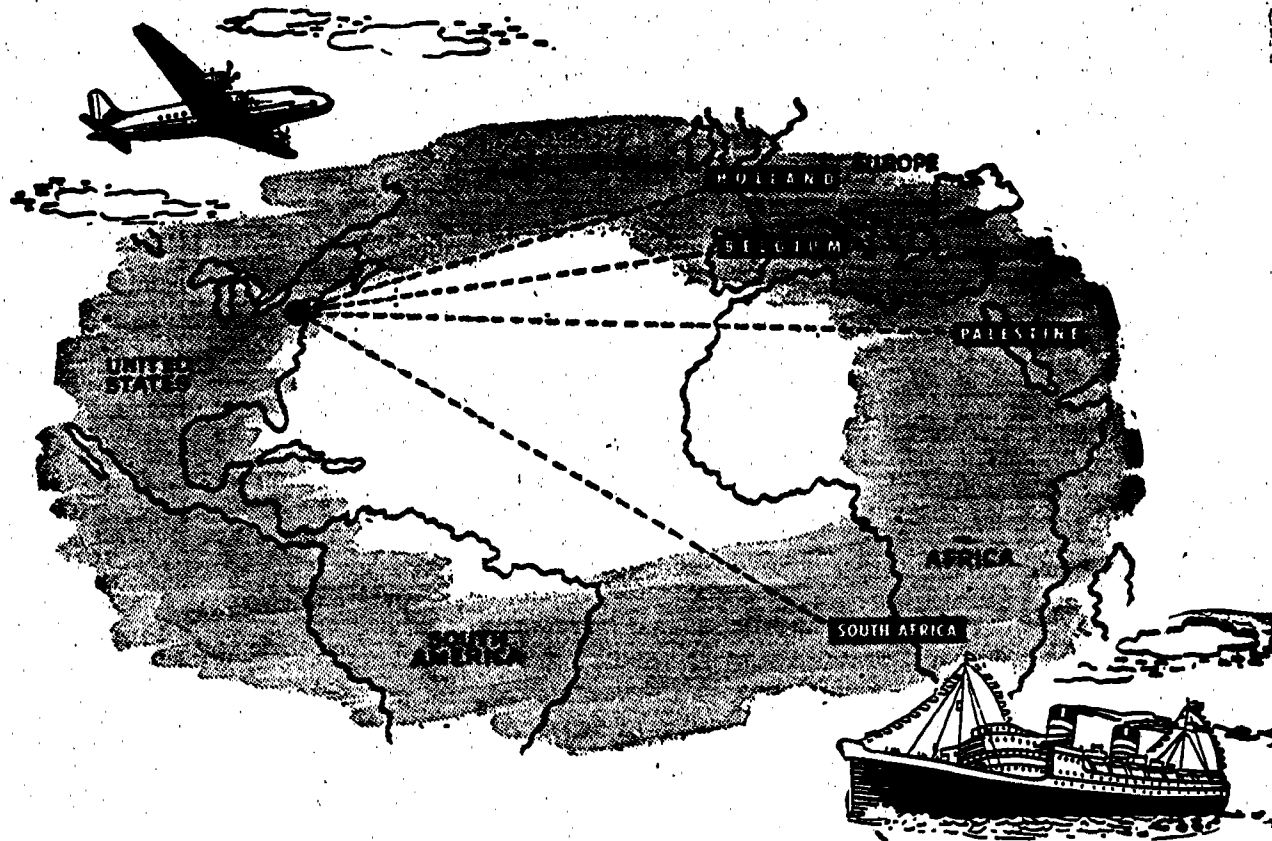

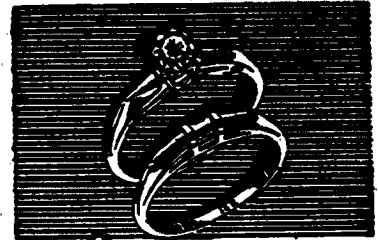

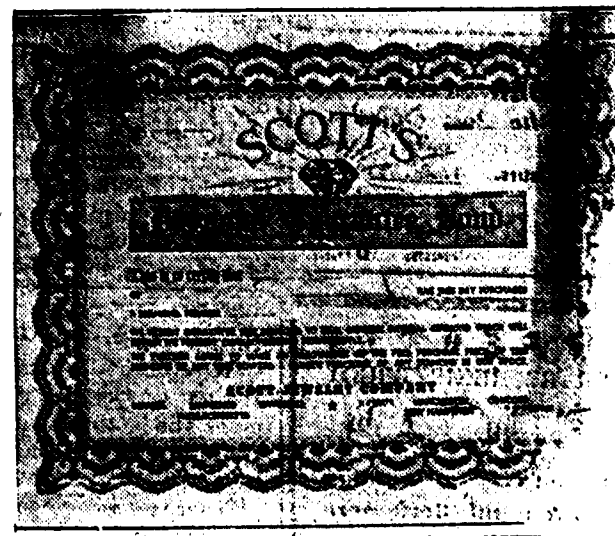
