## Napoleon Landry Dies As Car Plunges Into River

BENNINGTON — On his way to work in Winchendon, Mass., in the early morning hours on Monday, Napoleon Landry, 38 met his death as a result of an automobile accident. A passing truck driver discovered the accident which took place at Sweeney's bridge.

He fell about twenty feet into the river below in Peterboro. Police Chief Albert J. Picard investigator stated that there was evidence that a tire had blown causing the accident. The truck driver discovered the car about 6:15 a.m.

A crew from the Peterboro Fire Department under Chief David J. Rothford's direction recovered the car and body from the river.

Mr. Landry is survived by his widow, Mrs. Priscilla (Gloria) Landry; his father, Felix Landry and a brother, Arthur Landry. Mr. Landry and his wife have resided, for the last five years, in town. He came to chop lumber in a nearby woods and has stayed ever since. They have made their home recently in what was formerly known as the "Manning place" on the Acre and is now owned by Mr. Lavender.

Having no children of their own, Mr. and Mrs. Landry were caring for a six weeks old baby with the idea in mind of adopting the little girl.

Funeral services were held at the Congregational church Wednesday with the Jellison Funeral Home in charge.

### Start Work On New Hillsborough Bandstand

HILLSBORO — A new bandstand is being constructed at Grimes Field under the supervision of Selwyn Davis. It is due to be ready for the first band concert of the summer season later this month.

The committee, of which Roger F. Connor is chairman, selected the type of bandstand because of its better acoustic properties and is similar in design to the modern bandstand of a large Midwestern city.

The selectmen endorsed the project and although the bandstand will be temporary this year, it is expected that a permanent one will be placed in position next year at Grimes Field.

Hillsboro had the first incorporated band in the state and down through the years band concerts have been given each week by the local musicians.

Meanwhile, Chief of Police Oliver Williamson of Milford reported that for months after the story out-of-state tourists identified Milford as the "town with the big snake." The Harvard professor had a chuckle when the missing cat returned.

Proctor insisted Harvard was wrong. But he never got proof. Many people wrote to him telling him they had seen snakes that could easily measure over six feet but they had never actually measured them.

Now, however, Proctor can claim top position in the dispute because State Trooper Maurice Ferguson and Police Chief Edmund O'Leary of this town measured a black snake that is six feet, six inches. The reptile was killed by Joseph Pynenburg, Jr., of this town, while he was crou hunting.
