OFFICE OF THE SELECTMEN Antrim, N. H.

In pursuance of powers granted to us by Section 15 of Chapter 59 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire, we the Selectmen of the Town of Antrim, New Hampshire, at a meeting held on the seventh day of May, 1947, have passed the following regulations of the use of public highways and sidewalks in Antrim, N. H.

I. All parking of motor vehicles on the west side of Main Street and on the east side of Main Street from a point opposite the Fire Station to Elm Street and on the east side of Concord Street from Main Street to Elm Street shall be limited between the hours of 7:00 a. m. and 12:00 p. m. to two

II. It shall be unlawful to park on East side of Main Street from Prospect Street to a point opposite the Fire Station and on the West side of Concord Street from Main Street to Elm Street at any time.

III. It shall be unlawful to park any motor vehicle on either side of Main Street from Prospect Street to Elm Street and on either side of Concord Street between Main Street and Elm Street between the hours of 12:00 p.m., and 7:00 a.m.

IV. It shall be unlawful for any motor vehicle to obstruct any sidewalk in Town.

V. It shall be unlawful for any one to ride a bicycle on any sidewalk in the Town.

The penalty for the violation of any of the above regulations shall not exceed twenty dollars for each

The above regulations shall take effect on the date of their approval by the Highway Commissioner of the State of New Hampshire.







armament under effective international control. That is the beginning of peace It is the necessary condition of success for the United Nations or for any intelligent program of economic rehabilitation.

Disarmament is not just reduc-Plan or something as good, the universal abolition of military conscription, the demilitarization of narrow waterways and island bases, and the reduction of all armed forces on land, sea and in the air to a police level, execpt perhaps where quotas are necessary, for a amount of money required to be plan of international security. With this disarmament must go the liquidation of imperialism if for no other reason than that arms sufficient to preserve empires are sufficient for aggression. Certain moderate reforms must be made in order that the UN can function effectively against aggression and breach of disarmament agreements.

The President, Secretary of State. American representatives to the UN should be urged to appeal at the September meeting of the Assembly of the UN for this universal disarmament.

It won't do to say "Stalin will refuse." It is all too likely that the first response may be in the negative. We cannot tell until we try. And much American militarism and imperialism mask behind the easy assurance of Stanlin's refusal. Even his refusal would not prevent the American proposal from clarifying the issue, arousing people out of their bewildered stupor, showing us where we stand, and on whom and on what we can count in the struggle for security and

peace. The time to act is now. The Post War World Council will be glad to send further material on this whole subject. It is trying to select statements and resolutions. It will, therefore, welcome correspondence on the subject.




