



## Hillsboro School Lunch Program Visited by Messenger Photographers



The Hillsboro School Lunch Program is entirely self-supporting. Each child pays twenty cents for his complete meal and later, at the end of each month, the State Department of Education pays to the local program, nine cents more for each lunch that has been served. In order to qualify for this state aid for the lunches, it is necessary to certify that no boy or girl who needs a lunch is deprived of it because he or she can not possibly

afford it. Consequently it is necessary to give lunches to several pupils who are unable to pay twenty cents per day although the state pays its nine cents for each of these. Children are awarded these free lunches upon the advice of the teachers and school nurse or Welfare supervisors. In many cases this is the most nutritious meal eaten by these children. Since the income for the sale of

lunches has to pay for all the lunchroom expenses, including labor and food, it is quite difficult to supply many lunches free. Last year several local organizations donated funds to pay for such free lunches, and the program was helped by that much. It is good reasoning to assume that the value of the meal served has to be in proportion to the amount of money available to pay for it. Many people ask how the federal

government fits into this picture. The answer is that the State Department of Education gets its funds from the federal government, from which it pays the nine cents subsidy to the Hillsboro school lunch program. Last week your Messenger photographers visited the Hillsboro elementary school at lunch time. We can attest to the fact that the food was of excellent quality because we joined the teachers' at

their table, eating the same food as do the children. The meal that day consisted of sandwiches, milk, choice of Welsh rarebit or spaghetti and chocolate pudding. Some of the children came back for seconds and yes, thirds. Our first picture is that of Mrs. Frank Mosley and Mrs. Clarence Nelson, who operate the lunch program. They begin their day long before the actual serving. Mrs. Mosley also plans the menu. She

said that an average of 120 meals are served daily. Mrs. Theodore Murdough, principal of the elementary school, is shown enjoying a dish of Welsh rarebit in our next picture. Our next candid shot is that of John Evans and Fay Poland, and in our last picture we find George Broadley washing dishes at the kitchen sink. He should be a big help at home. Messenger Photos





## EDITORIAL COMMENT

### Shame

Two Democratic congressmen, James Richards of South Carolina and Eugene Keogh of New York, were robbed of \$5,000 on a train in Spain while enroute to see Fascist Dictator Franco about "bettering U. S.-Spanish relations."

The congressmen are lucky. All they lost was \$5,000. What they propose to do would rob the American people of any pretensions to promoting democracy.

One might expect a Southern Democrat to embrace Franco. Bourbon racism is reasonably close to fascism. But when supposedly "liberal" New York Congressmen like Keogh and James Murphy (who called Franco "a very lovely and lovable character") snuggle up to the world's leading unhung Fascist, we ought to expect a tremendous outpouring of protest from every

decent person in America.

The ostensible excuse for an alliance with Fascism is the need to defeat Communism. If the alternative to Communism is Fascism, then the world might just as well commit suicide. No decent person would want to live in it, except as an underground opponent of both.

The facts are that a deal with Franco, far from stopping Communism, would be the greatest break that Stalin could possibly secure in Europe. It would demoralize all the democratic forces of Europe, give color to Communist charges that the United States wants to re-impose Fascism on Europe, and force untold millions into the Communist camp.



States. Her escort was Jefferson Murdough, a very handsome man. The ladies mentioned are descendants from a long line of beautiful women. The Kimball family are one of the oldest in the United States. Having come from England to Ipswich, Massachusetts, in 1634. The above information came from Mrs. Florence Kimball Favor. I am also interested as my great grandmother was Mehitable Kimball, who was a sister of Mrs. Favor's great grandfather, and who lived on the Elton Colby place. I am not sure. Our great great grandfather owned all the land in this section from the Woodbury property, well up the line. The family was frequently called out at night to drive the wolves from the sheep pens and the children frequently saw bears on the way up to the corner schoolhouse, just above the Henry I.
